New York, Aug. 27.—(AP)—Further war apprehension was the principal excuse given by brokers today for another dragging and uneven stock market performance. A few rails, coppers and specialties managed to take on a mild recovery tinge but many leaders were a shade under water when the final gong sounded and numerous stocks held at Monday's levels or near even opened.

Dealings picked up at intervals and transfers of around 225,000 shares compared with 161,000 yesterday which was the second smallest turnover for a full session in 24 years. Wall Street was still hopeful for the British but sentiment was confused by persistent heavy Nazi bombing raids on England, despite retaliatory air raids of the R.A.F. on Germany.

Individual shares were propped by good business items, including earnings and dividends. Tax problems, at the same time, clouded the speculative scene. NOTED DEAD

Fitchburg, Mass., Aug. 27.—(AP)—Major General Benjamin A. Poore, 77, world war hero and commander of the seventh corps area at the time of his retirement in 1927, died today.

A native of Center, Ala., he was graduated from West Point in 1896 with Generals Pershing, Patrick, Menoher, McIntyre and Hay. His first service was with the 12th infantry at Maddison Barracks, N. Y., Fort Sully, North Dakota, and Fort Leavenworth. Poore was appointed brigadier general in 1917 and then was assigned to the 7th brigade of the 4th division, which sailed for France in 1918. He saw action at Chateau Thierry, the Aisne-Marne offensive, St. Mihiel, and the Meuse-Argonne.
