SALEM GIFT TAX CLAIMS SETTLED

Washington, Aug. 28.—(AP)—The board of tax appeals disclosed settlement today of \$354,000 in gift tax claims for 1924 against 22 persons named in trusts established by Charles Henry Sanford who died in 1928. Terms of the settlement were not revealed. The 22 persons had petitioned the board against the internal revenue bureau's claim that they owed the \$354,000. Among persons named in the stipulations and the individual amounts involved in the controversies were Frederick I. Sanford, \$17,000, and Eunice Elia Sanford, \$17,000, Salem, Ore.
