

# WALLACE CHARGES GOP. WIN WILL BE HELP FOR HITLER

administration could act effectively, they might have their chance.

He termed the European conflict "a war to destroy freedom and democracy."

"It is a war to prevent the people of North and South America from developing their resources without paying tribute to Europe and without being victims of European secret police serving a self-appointed master race."

The crowd, waving cornstalks, cheered the defense and neutral sections of the speech. The current rearmament drive has produced "splendid" results, Wallace said, "but it is only a start. It will be pushed until America is fully prepared to defend herself against any emergency."

### Old Slogan Used

Elsewhere he declared: "By preparing completely now, we shall have the best chance of keeping out of war." Reviewing methods being used to stamp out fifth column activities in the United States, Wallace said:

"We are determined to break up the gigantic international conspiracy through which the Nazis are trying to subjugate our country."

The speaker declared the "real attitude" of the GOP toward farm legislation was exhibited a month ago in congress where Republican house members voted 106 to 38 against an appropriation for commodity loans.

"The Republican leaders say nice things about the farm program to get votes from the farmer," he said. "But when it comes to voting for the farmer, they don't deliver the goods."

### F. D. R. Approves

Hyde Park, N. Y., Aug. 30—(AP)—President Roosevelt acclaimed Henry A. Wallace's acceptance address today as a "grand speech, splendidly given before an appreciative nation" in which his running mate had made "a glorious start."

The president and Mrs. Roosevelt and their son, Franklin, Jr., sat besides a radio in the library of their home last night and listened to the address in which Secretary Wallace formally accepted his nomination as the Democratic vice-presidential candidate.

Then the chief executive dispatched this telegram, made public today at the temporary White House, to his political teammate:

Henry A. Wallace,  
Des Moines, Iowa.

A grand speech and splendidly given before an appreciative nation. We have been sitting at the radio and only wish that all of us Roosevelts could have been with the Wallaces in Des Moines tonight. You have made a glorious start. All good luck and my affectionate regards.

Franklin D. Roosevelt.

# SALARY INCREASE FRETS JOSEPHINE

Grants Pass, Aug. 30—(AP)—Auditor A. W. Mundt criticized what he called "wholesale" increases in road department salaries without adequate notation in the county court journal in a report for the second half of 1939 filed today. # STATISTICS SHOW 5 DIE LABOR DAY

Salem, Aug. 30—(AP)—At least five persons will be killed in traffic accidents during the coming Labor day week-end in Oregon if the Labor day accident rate of the past three years is sustained, Secretary of State Earl Snell warned today in urging motorists to drive carefully.

Seventeen lives have been claimed in traffic accidents on Labor day week-ends during 1939, 1938 and 1937, an average of 5.6 persons killed per week-end, Snell said.

# INDICT GENERAL ELECTRIC, KRUPPS FOR CONSPIRACY

New York, Aug. 30—(AP)—In what federal prosecutors termed the most important national defense indictment yet returned, a special U. S. grand jury today indicted the General Electric company and the Krupp company, of Essen, Germany, on charges of conspiracy to fix prices and restrain interstate and foreign commerce in hard metal composition tools and dies.

Named with General Electric and Krupp were Walter M. Stearns, of Schenectady, manager of trade relations and special contracts for General Electric; the Carboly company, of Detroit; wholly-owned subsidiary of General Electric; W. G. Robbins, president, and Zay Jeffers, of Cleveland, chairman of Carboly.

The government charged that the Krupp corporation, famous for many years as Germany's chief source of war materials, held a veto power over the issuance of patent licenses to American firms in the manufacture of hard metal compositions used in machine cutting tools.
