F. D. R. DEDICATES TENNESSEE DAM

Chattanooga, Tenn., Sept. 2.—(AP)—Amid the thundering applause of thousands of southerners, President Roosevelt dedicated mammoth Chickamauga dam today to the "total defense" of America. "Today we are facing a time of peril unmatched in the history of the nations of all the world," the president said. "And because we are undertaking the total defense of our nation, the Tennessee valley region has assumed, in addition to its own domestic betterment, the share of responsibility for national defense." After the address his schedule called for him to move by train and motor to a highway gap in a towering ridge of mountains to dedicate in the late afternoon the Great Smoky Mountains national park.

DEFENSE ACTIVITY EXPECTED TO CUT UNEMPLOYED LIST

Gradual Sustained Pickup to Give Three Million Jobs in Next 10 Months

Washington, Sept. 2.—(AP)—Administration economists made a Labor day prediction today that the national defense program, with conscription included, would cut unemployment in half by next July 1, reducing the number of jobless from 9,000,000 to 4,500,000.

They said they expected a gradual sustained pickup in industrial employment to provide jobs for more than 3,000,000 men in the next ten months. Mobilization of the national guard and the inauguration of conscription, including favorable congressional action on the latter score—would account for another 1,000,000 reduction in unemployment by late spring, they estimated. In the case of compulsory military training, the jobless total may be reduced both by conscription of unemployed youths and by the hiring of men without work to fill jobs vacated by employed conscripts. Manufacture of uniforms and equipment for the trainees is expected to employ thousands. Plane factories, shell plants, tank manufacturing and scores of other industries are listed as new employment opportunities.

320 CHILDREN SAFE AFTER TORPEDOING OF REFUGEE LINER

London, Sept. 2.—(AP)—Three hundred and twenty children rescued from Britain's first torpedoed refugee liner were brought home today to boast to their parents that it took only three and a half minutes to jump out of bed and get to their lifeboat stations.

Their lack of panic and their thorough training for such an emergency brought all of them through safely, the ministry of information announced, when the ship taking them to Canada was hit last Friday night. The vessel remained afloat, it was announced, but the children were removed in lifeboats and transferred to rescue vessels. The latter were not identified.

The ministry, which withheld the news until last night, did not name the liner nor did it say where the torpedoing occurred. German spokesmen said it was "noteworthy" the British named neither the ship nor the place of the reported torpedoing, and added that "Germany isn't in the business of sinking child refugee ships."
