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## DEATH COMES TO COURT HALL, 74, PIONEER CITIZEN

Court Hall, pioneer resident of southern Oregon, passed away at his home, 315 South Central, early this morning. He had been in failing health for some time.

Mr. Hall was born in Carysville, Ohio, November 7, 1866. At the age of two years he came to Oregon with his parents, Jasper N. and Florence D. Hall by way of Panama. They settled at Myrtle Creek, returning to Ohio during the Modoc War. In 1881, at the age of 15, he returned to Oregon. This time he came to Central Point where he lived with an uncle. For a time he was employed on the Southern Pacific Railroad, working in the Cow Creek canyon.

From 1900 to 1906 he taught school in what was then known as the Lone Pine school, which was near what is now Medford. In 1889 he was united in marriage to Mabel C. Owen of Central Point. Three years later they moved to Medford where they have lived continuously since. For the last 30 years he has been engaged in the orchard business, known as the Young & Hall orchard.

Mr. Hall operated the first automobile stage between Medford and Crater lake. He also brought the first airplane to this valley.

He was a charter member of the BPOE of Medford, being one of those active in its formation. He was active in the order up until failing health kept him at home.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Mabel C. Hall; one son, Seely V. Hall of Piedmont, Cal.,

and one sister, Miss Pearl Hall of Lakeview. Complete funeral arrangements will be announced later by the Conger Funeral Parlors.

## DRIZZLE DAMPENS HOLIDAY CROWDS

Portland, Sept. 2.—(P)—A steady, light rain dampened many sections of northwestern Oregon today as Labor Day crowds swarmed to vacation spots and the state fair.

Portland and Eugene each received rain. Salem remained dry under threatening clouds.

The federal weather bureau predicted partly cloudy conditions tonight and Tuesday, with scattered light showers in the western portion and over mountains, cooler weather in eastern Oregon and gentle, changeable winds off the coast.

Astoria, Ore., Sept. 2.—(P)—The 29th annual Astoria regatta, staged despite a fire that destroyed the regatta pavilion two days before the opening, was over today, and Oregon's fishing center at the mouth of the Columbia river returned to normal.

Highlight of Saturday's final program was the free-for-all outdoor motorboat racing championship, captured by Don Stansell of Klamath Falls, who nosed out Tony Wirotek of Portland. Cliff Shields of Portland placed third.

## WILLKIE APPEALS FOR COOPERATION

Rushville, Ind., Sept. 2.—(P)—In the midst of arranging a campaign conference with Republican leaders of 22 states, Wendell L. Willkie made a Labor Day appeal today for national cooperation in "overcoming our present economic stagnation and wiping out unemployment".

If elected president, he said in a statement, he would seek the support of labor, industry, agriculture and all other groups to that end.

"I also promise," he continued, "to arrest the present trend toward placing labor unions under government control."

"The statement of that great labor leader, Samuel Gompers, 'what the government gives, the government can take away', is particularly pertinent at the present time. We must rely upon the compulsion of the law only as a last extremity."

"I shall lend every influence to establish forthright collective bargaining between management and men upon a basis of good will, conciliatory, and economic voluntarism and free from interference."

## Bonneville Power Goes to New Plant

Portland, Ore., Sept. 2.—(P)—Bonneville power flowed today into the American Aluminum corporation of America's new plant at Vancouver, Wash.

The first power from the great dam on the Columbia river reached the plant Saturday, as the company began test operations for the production of aluminum, scheduled to start in eight days.

Construction of the plant began eight months ago.

## MURDER, SUICIDE IN APARTMENT

Everett, Wash., Sept. 2.—(P)—Evelyn Butters, a waitress, and Ace Casey, a pool hall employe, died here yesterday in what Prosecutor Henry M. Jackson called a murder and a suicide.

The two were found, Casey still alive, in a flaming apartment at 9 a. m. yesterday after other residents of the building were awakened by an explosion which blew out windows.

Jackson said the couple, both nude, were bound together with a length of rope. He estimated that Miss Butters had died four hours previously from strangulation. Casey died without regaining consciousness an hour after being taken to a hospital.

## LILLIAN WALD, NOTED SOCIAL WORKER, DIES

Westport, Conn., Sept. 2.—(P)—Lillian Wald, 73, founder of the famous Hull House settlement in New York City, author, and close friend of President and Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, died last night.

Miss Wald, who devoted her life to social reform, had been ill for some time at her home, "House on the Pond," here.

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
