

J. A. M'DOUGALL COMMISSIONER IN SCOUT AREA

Appointment of J. A. McDougall as Scout commissioner for district one of Medford marked the monthly meeting of the Medford district Scout committee last night at the Boy Scout office. McDougall will take over general supervision of all Scout and Cub units in Medford south of Main street and including Jacksonville and Phoenix.

According to Seth M. Bullis, district chairman, the Medford district which consists of sixteen Scout and Cub units will, for administrative purposes, be divided into three districts, each supervised by a volunteer commissioner. In addition to McDougall, Paul Peterson will supervise scouting activities outside of Medford in Gold Hill, Rogue River, Central Point, and Trail. A third commissioner, yet to be selected, will serve all of Medford north of Main street.

The camping program at Camp McLoughlin was the subject of a report by Dale Smith, camping chairman for the district. He reported that the camp showed an increase over 1939 of one hundred and twenty-nine percent in camper weeks and an increase of ninety-five percent in different boys in camp. "This was our largest camping season in the 12 years of the camp," said Smith.

Plans were laid for a training course for volunteer Scout leaders and for a district Scout rally to be held in October.
