

STATE HOSPITAL EXPANSION NEED TOLD PHYSICIANS

More Space, Modernized Facilities Urged in Report to Medical Convention

Eugene, Sept. 6.—(P)—A definite need for more space and modernized facilities at the state hospital in Salem was reported today by Dr. C. H. Manlove, Portland, chairman of the Oregon state medical society committee on medical education and hospitals.

Dr. Manlove, in his report to the society, during the 66th annual session here, said "an additional building and equipment for 350 beds" would be "scarcely enough to house the existing patient load, to say nothing of the additional patients who will be added during the coming years."

The committee's report, prepared after conferring with the superintendent of the hospital and visiting the grounds, has been presented to the house of delegates of the society. Action is expected Saturday when the report is returned from the reference committee.

The committee indicated the oldest building was "unquestionably antiquated" and equipped with inadequate facilities. The other buildings of the hospital group were noted as well-equipped and cared for, but also overcrowded.

Besides recommending the construction of a new unit, the committee suggested the addition of two trained psychiatrists to the present staff.

U. S. CUTTERS GUARD SOLE WORLD SOURCE OF VALUABLE METAL

New York, Sept. 6.—(P)—The Brooklyn Eagle says four heavily-armed U. S. coast guard vessels manned by 500 men have established a protective patrol over Greenland's cryolite mines, the world's only commercial source of the important mineral used in refining aluminum.

Coincident with the disclosure, the state department in Washington today forbade officers and crew members of the cutter Comanche, which returned from the Greenland patrol yesterday, to talk about their work, according to the paper.

The Eagle says the cutters Comanche, George W. Campbell, Northland and Duane have been based at Ivigtut, southwest of Greenland, since June 1 to protect the valuable mines, which produce a metal used in extracting aluminum from bauxite ore, making it valuable to the airplane industry.

The Eagle story goes on to say: Eske Brun, governor of Greenland, which is Danish-owned, said that he had been in New York since July 9 for the specific purposes of marketing the rare metal.

CANADA MAY GET AGED U. S. TANKS

Washington, Sept. 6.—(P)—General George C. Marshall, army chief of staff, said today that the United States was considering a proposal to release several hundred of its obsolete World War tanks to Canada for use in training.

The United States army, he said, is forbidden by action of congress from using the tanks at all.

Replying to numerous questions about the progress of the defense program at a press conference, General Marshall acknowledged that the army had only about 300 of "the most modern combat types" of airplanes, but added that it had 1,500 "tactical" planes in the general headquarters force which "we would use."

Hop Sale Limit 37,000,000 Lbs.

Washington, Sept. 6.—(P)—The surplus marketing administration today approved 37,000,000 pounds as the maximum quantity of 1940 hops produced in Washington, Oregon and California which might be handled in interstate and foreign commerce in the 1940-41 marketing year.

The administration said this total was expected to permit each grower to market his entire 1940 production.
