## Former Residents Of Europe to Lecture in City

Relating eye-witness accounts of the siege of Warsaw and of war life in London, two former European women are to speak in Medford the evening of September 23. They are Countess Morag Zamoyska of Poland and Mrs. Ivion Macadam of London, England, who will appear in Medford under the sponsorship of the Jackson County League of Women Voters. Both now reside in Portland.

"The Destruction of Warsaw" is the topic of the countess, who was in Warsaw when that city was besieged by the Nazi troops. She will describe the siege, considered the most violent air and artillery attack of all history, and give first hand accounts of the occupation of Poland.

Countess Zamoyska before her marriage to the Polish nobleman was a MacLeod from the Isle of Skye, Scotland. She was unable to leave Poland until November of last year and her husband is listed as an occupant of a German concentration camp.

Mrs. Macadam will speak on "England At War." She was in London as late as June of this summer and spent her last night before sailing in an air raid shelter during an all-night alarm. Mrs. Macadam will supplement her own first-hand impressions with information received recently from her husband who is still a resident of London.

Place of the lecture will be announced later.
