

FORMER RESIDENT SAYS TULE LAKER STOLE HIS WIFE

Two former residents of this city, William Thome and his wife, Hazel, and Arthur M. Macken, Tule Lake rancher and Klamath Falls business man, are principals in a love-balm suit for \$25,000 filed in Siskiyou county, Cal., and Klamath county, advices received here today. Thome alleges Macken alienated the affections of his mate.

The Thomes resided here in 1939, and that year moved to Klamath Falls. Thome is an auto mechanic, his wife a waitress.

The complaint states that after moving to Klamath Falls, Mrs. Thome obtained employment in a Klamath Falls fountain lunch and that Macken immediately began frequenting the place. The couple separated July 15 last.

The complaint specifically alleges: "That defendant, Arthur W. Macken, by his persistent personal attentions to Mrs. Thome, wife of the plaintiff, and his frequent and secret association with her, wrongfully, wickedly, intentionally and with wanton and reckless disregard for his rights, alienated the affections of Hazel Thome, wife of plaintiff, depriving him of the society, comfort, assistance and cooperation of said wife; has broken up his home; has destroyed his plans for a secure and happy old age in a home of his own with himself and his wife, which had been his hope and plan; has caused plaintiff great mental anguish and humiliation, chagrin and uncertainty as to his future—and there is left for him only a claim for money damages."
