## CALIFORNIA HAS 90 ON HAND FOR INITIAL WORKOUT

Horrell Predicts 'Powerful' Team for UCLA—Sprinter on Hand at Stanford.

San Francisco, Sept. 13.—(AP)—The 1940 football season was underway officially on the Pacific slope today with hundreds of padded athletes whipping themselves into shape for initial games only two weeks away.

Turnouts were large for the most part yesterday, the first day of practice for Pacific coast conference schools and most of the major independents.

More than 90 varsity candidates reported to Leonard "Stub" Allison at University of California. The Bears have a date with Michigan at Berkeley Sept. 28, and Allison put the boys through their paces with no delay.

Seventy-one, with more expected shortly, turned out at University of California at Los Angeles, the largest Bruin squad in history. Head Coach Edwin "Babe" Horrell predicted he would have "another powerful team."

Jones Satisfied  
Howard Jones looked over 65 candidates at University of Southern California, and said he was satisfied with the turnout although about 10 more had been expected. U. S. C. conference winner and Rose Bowl team the past two seasons, must replace three ace backfield men—Ambrose Schindler, Grenville Lansdell and Doyle Nave.

University of Washington, picked by many to set the conference pace this year, had two sessions yesterday with 53 men on deck. Stanford, with Clark Shaughnessy the new head coach after a disastrous 1939 campaign, had 60 men reporting, including as a halfback candidate Clyde Jeffrey, one of the country's fastest sprinters.

The Oregon State college outfit, weeded out in spring practice, totaled 39. University of Oregon also had a light turnout.

A half dozen or so veterans were expected today at University of Idaho to bolster the squad of 36 which reported to Coach Ted Bank. Mac Beall, 1938 quarterback, is back after a year's layoff.

New York, Sept. 13.—(AP)—Steve Belloise, the kid who began his fighting at a family picnic and who does fancy needlework for fun, gets a crack at the world middleweight championship on November 1.

By outpointing the veteran ex-titler, Ceferino Garcia, in 10 rounds before a crowd of 10,869 in Madison Square Garden last night, the Bronx youngster not only scored his 25th straight victory, but also was signed immediately by Promoter Mike Jacobs to tangle with Ken Overlin, the Virginia boxing "cutie." Overlin, who holds that portion of the title recognized in California and New York, was sitting at the ringside.

Neither Belloise nor the Filipino exploded any of the right-hand bombs for which they are famous, and most of the action was in close, with Referee George Walsh having a busy evening breaking clinches. As a fight, there wasn't much to it, with the veteran Garcia apparently unable to do anything with Steve's snaky, unorthodox left hand.

## ASHLAND TRAVELS TO LAKEVIEW FOR FOOTBALL OPENER

Ashland, Sept. 13.—(Spl.)—Ashland high school's 1940 football team, untested and untried, will face its baptism of fire against the Lakeview high school eleven tonight on the Lakeview field.

Himself new to Ashland's grid battles, Coach Leighton Blake declared that no positions on the varsity would be secure until after the first game. The current line-up was announced Thursday following practice sessions but the mentor made it plain that the players on the first string will have to earn their places.

Starting the game Friday will be John Bergstrom, left end; Dick Westerberg, left tackle; Ivan Randles, left guard; Russ Hawk, center; Clyde Garrett, right guard; Albert Newberry, right tackle; Chet Fowler, right end; Charlie Jandreau, left half; Bob Weaver, right half; Martin Herrin, fullback and Ken Caton, quarter. Coach Blake added however, that last minute changes may shift the starting line-up.

A few lettermen are returning, but May graduation this year cut a deep swath in the ranks. Jandreau is the only member of the 1939 varsity to again hold his position.

Some of the newcomers however, are expected to do themselves proud before the end of the season. Those now slated for important cogs in the Grizzly machine are La Mar Ormond, at right tackle; Bud Provost who was one of the hoop stars of last year; Dick Westerberg and Russ Hawk.
