HEAVY DOWNPOUR DRENCHES REGION

A heavy downpour late last night drenched the city and gave the town an official weather bureau total precipitation of .27 of an inch for the 24 hours ended at 4:30 a. m. Showers in the afternoon were followed by the heavy rain between 11:15 p. m. and 12:11 a. m. The weather bureau said it was likely the rain was heavier in other parts of the county than in town. More showers were predicted for tonight.

Accompanied by rain measuring up to as much as half an inch, a lightning storm swept over parts of the Rogue River national forest late yesterday. Only one fire was set by the lightning, however, and it was quickly put out.

The lone strike occurred on Sherwood creek in the Union Creek district of the forest near the Umpqua divide. The storm passed over the Applegate and Butte Falls districts and part of the Union Creek district.

1,863 Oregon Aliens On Registry Lists

Washington, Sept. 13.—(AP)—The justice department announced today that 451,146 aliens have registered through September 9 under the new alien control law.

Among the totals by states were: Idaho, 523; Montana, 1,357; Oregon, 1,863; Washington, 8,092.

HUNTINGTON HIT BY CLOUDBURST

Baker, Ore., Sept. 13.—(AP)—Roaring down the hillsides south of the town with terrific force, a cloudburst "blitzkrieged" Huntington, 49 miles east of here Thursday evening, causing damage estimated at \$9000 to \$12,000.

No one at Huntington was injured in the storm, declared to be the worst in Huntington since the cloudburst of 1919.

State police officers here reported that a cloudburst five miles east of Malheur City in Malheur county took the life of Mrs. H. A. Wirth, when the house in which she was cooking was swept away by a wall of water.

Mr. Wirth contacted state police here and told them that the accident occurred Thursday night at 5:40.
