THIRD TERM STEP TO DICTATORSHIP

Oressona, Pa., Sept. 14.—(P) —U. S. Senator James J. Davis (R., Pa.) pictured a presidential third term as a prelude to dictatorship today and termed public power developments such as the TVA an "unfair" threat to the coal industry.

In a prepared campaign address for the Republican ticket at the November election, Davis told a Schuylkill county G.O.P. rally:

"The argument in favor of long terms of office and for dictators is always the same. It is the allegation that an emergency has arisen and that there is but one man capable of meeting it."

"Every dictator in history has risen to power on this philosophy."

Maize For Rails

Buenos Aires, Sept. 14.—(P) Agreement in principle, informed sources said today, has been reached on a barter agreement whereby Argentina would exchange 150,000 tons of her maize surplus—estimated at 7,000,000 tons—for an unspecified quantity of Spanish railway materials.

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PROMOTION WORK ON WINTER PEARS WILL START SOON

Webster and Havighorst of Pear Bureau Leave for Activity in Eastern Mart

Seattle, Wash., Sept. 14.—(Spl.) — Roy Webster, eastern manager of the Oregon-Washington-California Pear Bureau, and C. R. Havighorst, merchandising expert on pear bureau staff, left last week for eastern markets to begin promotional work back of fall and winter pears from the three Pacific coast states.

Their first call is Kansas City, Mo., to participate in a food show program at the Super-Market convention, September 23-25; other food shows definitely contracted for are the Washington, D. C., food show, October 7-12; Philadelphia food show, November 7-16; Florida state fair, Tampa, February 4-15, inclusive; and a food show at Tulsa, Okla., in October, date not yet set.

Cincinnati Hub. Mr. Webster will make his headquarters in Cincinnati, O., and cover the surrounding area thoroughly this season, including Indianapolis, Columbus, and possibly some Kentucky cities. This is virgin territory for pear bureau promotion.

Thomas Boyd, who for three years has assisted Webster in the east, is making his headquarters at Washington, D. C., and will "work" the area including Baltimore, the Virginias, and the northern part of North Carolina. Parts of this area were covered last year and the preceding year, so that Boyd's work is in the nature of further development.

Road Shows Slated. Mr. Havighorst will conduct a complete "road show" at vari-

ous points, according to a definite schedule. Following the Kansas City convention he will visit Des Moines for several days, thence via Cincinnati and Pittsburgh to Boyd's territory, to conduct shows from October 15 to November 15. The following month he will put on shows in Roy Hazeltine's territory.

Hazeltine leaves Hood River the first week in October to headquarter in Atlanta, Ga., branching out into points in Alabama (particularly Birmingham), South Carolina, and the three principal Florida cities. Some of this territory was included in last year's fieldwork, so that it will be in the nature of furthering the educational and sales work done last year.

After the middle of December, if an additional man is placed in the south (to cover Arkansas, Mississippi and Tennessee), Havighorst will then stage shows in that area, joining Webster in the north after January 15; otherwise, he will join Webster in late December.

Careful Schedules.

Schedules have been arranged with an eye to the most economical transportation, concentration of man-power, and potentialities of markets, the pear bureau office states. Each man is equipped with a moving picture film of the pear industry, a moving picture projector, a kodaslide machine and slides featuring pears and pear dishes.

as well as display material and miscellaneous equipment. Instead of five road shows going simultaneously, as last year, it was felt that one complete road show put on by Mr. Havighorst, who is an expert in that line, would be more effective, the bureau reports, adding that with a business-like schedule in each area almost as many shows may be given as last year. The road show is an "evening of entertainment and education" for retailers, featuring winter pears.
