EUGENE PALLETTE TOPS SUPPORTING CAST SPICY SHOW

Alan Marshall in Prominent Role—Paris Background For Comedy

Loretta Young and Melvyn Douglas are the comedy starring combination of the delightful new laughfest, "He Stayed for Breakfast," opening a three day showing today at the Craterian Theatre. Also in the cast are Alan Marshall, Eugene Pallette and Una O'Connor.

Set in a Paris background, the new comedy hilariously describes the romance of a politically-conscious cafe waiter and the estranged wife of a pompous banker. Douglas, in the former role, is a fugitive from the law for having taken a pot-shot at the financier; Miss Young connives at his escape and, in the end, takes a shot at the financier herself!

Pallette, as the banker, provides his share of the complications. Anxious to restore himself to his former wife's good graces, equally anxious to capture the fugitive whom he suspects she is hiding, Pallette's presence on the scene lends telling effectiveness to a comedy of outrageously humorous consequences. In addition, Alan Marshall lends further humor to the film, in his role as the elegant young publisher of a newspaper. Eager to replace Pallette in Miss Young's affections, he has centered all the journalistic fire he can upon the unhappy husband. Shooting him is a good idea, and Marshall is in hearty accord with it—until he discovers that Miss Young is hiding the would-be assassin!

SCALISE FORMER UNION HEAD HELD GUILTY OF THEFT

New York, Sept. 14.—(AP)—George Scalise, former president of the Building Service Employees' International Union (A. F. L.), was convicted early today on five counts of an indictment accusing him of stealing \$9,662.27 of the union's funds.

A general sessions court jury, after deliberating for 17½ hours, reported convictions on four counts of third degree forgery and one count of grand larceny. The jury could not agree on five remaining counts of grand larceny.

Scalise faces a maximum sentence of five years on each forgery count and ten years on the grand larceny charge.

Originally the indictment contained 60 counts, but the number was reduced to 10 during the trial.

Arrested in his New York hotel room last April 21, the squat, 43-year-old union boss of 70,000 building service workers was indicted five days later on charges of conspiracy and extortion. The next day he resigned as president of the union.

His arrest was directed by District Attorney Thomas E. Dewey. Scalise was arrested after Westbrook Pegler, newspaper columnist, had accused the union leader of labor racketeering in a series of articles.
