LITTLE DAMAGE TO LONDON SHIPYARDS

London, Sept. 19.—(AP)—Nazi air raids have failed to cause any serious damage to London shipyards or to heavy industries in the capital, the ministry of home security said tonight.

The damage caused to arsenals has been negligible, the ministry said. After a study of the situation it declared the German raiders had destroyed 2 per cent of London's oil stocks, seriously but not permanently damaged an aircraft factory and damaged one gas plant.

Ministry spokesmen said they had found that the loss of oil amounted to less than half the monthly fluctuation in supplies and that it already had been made up. They added that there was huge reserve storage capacity for incoming stocks.

They admitted, however, that London had taken a terrific drubbing and that production had dropped in the metropolitan area.

DRAFT REGISTRY FORMS SPEEDED TO ALL STATES

To Print 32,000,000 Registration Cards — States Organizing Draft Boards

Washington, Sept. 19.—(AP)—Distribution of draft registration forms for printing began today, with master copies of the first four blanks speeding by airmail to the 48 states, where they will be reproduced by the millions.

The forms en route were the first of the series of 64 cards, questionnaires, placards, booklets and the like which will be needed in the huge task of enrolling 16,500,000 men next month and selecting some of them for military service. The ultimate cost of all draft printing is estimated at \$1,500,000.

Preparing in advance for the operation of the draft organization which the president is expected to call into official being today, army and navy selective service officials estimated that 32,000,000 registration cards, 24,000,000 registration certificates and 24,000,000 questionnaires would be required.

States Form Boards
As the printing orders went out, state draft organizations already were taking form in anticipation of presidential action. Illinois named 284 three-man draft boards subject to official appointment by Mr. Roosevelt. While its action was the first to be reported to Washington headquarters, other states were believed endorsing similar courses.

A house appropriations subcommittee, meanwhile, called Gen. George C. Marshall, army chief of staff, to testify at a closed hearing today on President Roosevelt's request on funds for starting the draft.

Mr. Roosevelt asked an additional \$1,733,886,976 cash and \$207,000,000 contract authorizations for the army, navy and other government branches participating in the defense program.

Informed sources said these sums would be sufficient to meet expenditures for draft trainees and mobilized national guardsmen until well into the 1941 calendar year.

While the war department was proceeding with its plans for the conscription, the senate wrote into the excess profits tax bill a provision enabling the president to establish allowances for dependents of those drafted.

The provision was phrased in broad language purposely in order that senate and house conferees may work out a more definite plan later. The outlay for dependents is expected to be relatively small at first, because the general policy will be to place men who are supporting other members of their family in a deferred classification. However, they may be drafted later.

JONES SWORN IN COMMERCE POST

Washington, Sept. 19.—(AP)—Jesse Jones, who said he wasn't very much excited about the job, became secretary of commerce today.

He was sworn in by Stanley Reed, associate justice of the supreme court, in the presence of President Roosevelt.

Just before going to the White House to take the oath of his new office, he was reminding inquirers that, although he had not been in the cabinet before, he had not been exactly idle during the eight years in which

he disbursed about \$10,000,000 through the reconstruction finance corporation and related agencies.

"The job I had was about as important as most," he smiled. It sounded as if he would have turned down the cabinet job if congress had not rushed through a law permitting him to retain his old post as federal loan administrator.
