

### CCC OPEN HOUSE ALL DAY SUNDAY AT UNION CREEK

Public Invited to Inspect Camp—Guides to Be Provided; Fine Record Noted

Open house will be held all day Sunday at Camp South Fork CCC side camp at Union Creek according to an announcement made today by Acting Company Commander Charles L. Snyder and Project Superintendent H. Barnhart. This is in keeping with the general open house policy of CCC during the month of May.

The public is invited to take this opportunity to become acquainted with projects which have been completed by the side camp at Union Creek, and inspect the camp itself. Guides will be provided for visitors calling at the camp during the day.

Organized since October, 1939 the camp personnel has an outstanding record of accomplishments and at present 40 CCC enrollees are quartered there. Among the projects completed have been construction of a warehouse with cruise quarters on the second floor; landscaping of ranger station grounds; construction of ranger station, camp ground, new rangers' office, gas and oil house, rustic foot bridge across Union Creek, trail maintenance, fire suppression work, electric wiring in warehouse, development of a spring and water supply, installation of pipe line, construction of dam and others.

Local officials of three major oil companies announced their gasoline prices had been increased half cent a gallon in Medford and Jackson county, while four of the companies here said they had not yet received instructions to increase their prices. The half a cent increase would make gasoline here cost 24 1/2 cents for premium grade, 22 1/2 cents for regular and 20 1/2 for third structure.
