

# MEDFORD TO AID CLUBHOUSE PLAN FOR ARMY BASES

### Will Share Raising of \$1500 Quota in County—State Chief Explains Aims.

I. B. Rhodes, Oregon state director for United Service Organizations for National Defense Inc., met with 14 local community-minded citizens in the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce Monday afternoon and received assurance that Medford would do its part in raising Jackson county's quota of \$1,500 in the organization's national campaign to raise \$10,765,000 to staff and operate 339 clubhouses which the government will build adjacent to training camps, naval bases and defense industry centers.

Following unanimous approval of the project, Glenn L. Jackson, president of the chamber of commerce, moved that the present Community Chest organization, having machinery for such an undertaking already set up, be asked to take over sponsorship of the county campaign. The motion passed without dissent.

**Federal Building.** Mr. Rhodes explained to the meeting that the government would build the clubhouses, \$10,000,000 having been appropriated by congress for the work, and that the sum the United Service Organizations seeks to raise will be used for the operation of the social centers for one year. The U.S.O. drive for \$10,765,000 will start on June 3 and end July 5, Mr. Rhodes said.

Purpose of the program, Mr. Rhodes explained, is to provide recreational facilities for the soldiers and sailors while off duty. "The greatest problem," Mr. Rhodes stated, "is not inside the army camps, but on the fringes; in the towns where the boys go when they are off duty."

Clubhouse accommodations, Mr. Rhodes said, would include organization of entertainment and games, meetings and social functions, light refreshments, reading and writing facilities, lounges and sleeping accommodations. The U.S.O. clubhouses, according to Mr. Rhodes, will serve soldiers, sailors, marines and defense workers, young women as well as men, in camps, bases and manufacturing areas where there are no adequate resources in nearby communities for recreational and welfare activities.

**Non-Profit Agency.** Mr. Rhodes explained that the United Service Organizations was incorporated as a non-profit agency by the following welfare agencies: Y.M.C.A., Salvation Army, Jewish Welfare Board, National Catholic Community Service, Y.W.C.A. and the National Travelers Aid association. Thomas E. Dewey of New York is national chairman and John D. Rockefeller, Jr., is national campaign chairman.

Gov. Charles A. Sprague is honorary chairman for U.S.O. in Oregon.

Earlier in the day Mr. Rhodes addressed a group in Ashland, where a committee was appointed and a pledge was made to raise Ashland's quota, probably \$500, by June 3. Edward Thornton was appointed chairman, William Briggs, secretary, and Gerald Wenner, treasurer.

### Would Repeal Roosevelt's Money Power

To the editor:  
A highly important matter is before congress, one that may be overlooked by the public because of the war news—a bill to renew on June 30, for a period of two years, the president's power to devalue the dollar nine points further than in 1934.

The enclosed article in Life (issue May 16), written by Harry Scherman, points out the contradiction in the fiscal policy of the administration, in again making this request of congress, and its deleterious effect upon the long-term credit of the government.

As you may know, this committee has repeatedly opposed this executive power to devalue; and it has recently been joined in this position by all the responsible officials of the federal reserve system, in their joint report to congress on January 1 last.

Vigorous protest, by those who recognize the crucial nature of this issue, may be effective at this moment. From out talks with senators and representatives, we can assure you that most of them are eager to obtain the views of those who have given thought to this matter.

The most promising action at this time would be letters from your readers, expressing their views on renewing this grant of executive power. Such letters should be sent to the congressmen and the senators representing your state and to the Senate Committee on Banking and Currency, Senate Office Building, Washington, D. C.
