

EIGHTH GRADERS OF JACKSON CO. GIVEN DIPLOMAS

300 in Ashland Program—Dean Jewell Advises Work Hard at Favorite Activity

"Pick out the thing you'd rather do than play and do it better than anyone else and you'll be one of the world's great men." This was the way Dean J. R. Jewell of University of Oregon, epitomized his advice of 300 eighth grade graduates of Jackson county who assembled at the Junior high school in Ashland yesterday morning to receive their diplomas.

The dean, often completing his thought with gestures carrying more meaning than words, dug back into the potato patch of his own boyhood for similes to drive home the point to his young listeners.

He told of his dislike of hoeing potatoes growing under clouds in the coral under Kansas heat, and of the joy he found in digging a cave in the same heat, thus pointing to the necessity of the individual doing the thing he enjoys most.

Sameness Not Aim

"Education in Oregon today is not trying to make everybody alike," he said. "It is helping to give every boy and girl a chance to do better than is normally expected of him." He told of his college roommate who persisted in whistling and was expelled, only to whistle his way into the concert halls of Europe. The dean said he once expelled Bob Burns of radio fame from the University of Arkansas for not getting his lessons. The dean chose "The Elements of Success" as his topic, the same used by a United States senator at the time of the dean's own eighth grade graduation in Kansas.

C. R. Bowman, county school superintendent, speaking briefly before presenting the diplomas, classified education in four divisions. First is the place of inquiring minds in the grade school, he said; next the adventure in high school of finding what one would rather do than play; third, specializing in college; and last, finding oneself in life.

Theo. J. Norby, superintendent of schools in Ashland, delivered the address of welcome to the crowd filling the auditorium. Invocation was given by the Rev. J. R. Turnbull of the First Baptist church in Ashland, and the Rev. Geo. W. Bruce of the Ashland First Methodist church gave the benediction. Selections were rendered by the orchestra of the Rogue River high school, directed by Edward C. Root.

The proud young graduates were presented their diplomas in their school groupings. Two students, Ferny McKibben of Howard and Elmer Kyle of Table Rock received special recognition as top ranking pupils in the county. Jack Richey of Applegate was recognized for meritorious achievement.

Provost pupils were not present, having attended exercises in Grants Pass.
