ATHLETIC AWARDS WON BY JOHNSON AND L. THURMAN

Track Star Given Schade Wristwatch—Grid Hero Gets \$50 Cash Prize

Racin' Ray Johnson, Oregon prep 440-yard dash champion for the past three years and Louis Thurman, husky quarterback on last season's state championship runners-up Medford high school football team, have been named the winners of the annual Larry Schade and William A. Gates athletic awards for the 1940-41 school year.

The 19-year-old Johnson, who holds the state record in the quarter mile with a mark of :49.5 and was never defeated at that distance in his three-year prep career, was awarded the Larry Schade wristwatch for the year's outstanding athletic, extra-curricular and scholastic achievement. Johnson was president of the Medford high student body during the past year, and ranked near the head of his class scholastically.

Thurman, 18-year-old blocking back for the team which lost to Bend, 20 to 7, for the state title last fall, was given the Gates \$50 cash award for the outstanding football squad contribution and inspiration, the money to apply on a college education. Thurman, a three-year grid veteran, kicked the field goal that beat Klamath Falls, 16 to 14, and was a driving force in all the Black Tornado's games.

Johnson will bring his high school running career to an end when he competes in the Compton, (Cal.) junior college invitational meet next Friday night. The 440-yard dash, which will pit Johnson against some of the Pacific coast's finest junior college and college quarter-milers, will be run at 9 p. m.

Feller pitched one of his magnificent games, scattering seven hits, striking out eight and allowing only two runners to get past first base—none after the third inning.

It was Rapid Robert's tenth victory against two defeats this season.

Manager Lou Sauer was still undecided today whether Bob Fox or Willard Smith, both right handers, would draw the pitching assignment for the opening clash Saturday night between Medford's State league Craters and the powerful Kelso, Wash., club in their two-game inter-state exhibition series.

Both Medford's hurlers will see action in the week-end series. Boss Sauer stated, with the one remaining idle Saturday night stepping to the mound Sunday afternoon.

Kelso, which will travel 365 miles for the series, will probably send Dick Ward, former San Diego Padre ace, to the rubber Saturday night, and come back with Glen Swetnam, former Lewiston, Idaho, elbow, in the Sunday fracas. The Washington team is expected to arrive here late Saturday afternoon.

The Craters will take the field for their most important exhibition series of the year with the same lineup that has represented the club in all recent games. Slater will do the catching, with Al Fleishman on first, Sauer on second, Del Schroer on short, Alex McDonald on third, Al (Wray) Lightner in left, Joe Gray in center and either Ed Eilertsen or Glen Swanson in right.

The Craters held a stiff workout yesterday afternoon and Manager Sauer said they showed signs of coming out of their prolonged batting slump. He stated that if the club could give Fox and Smith a few runs, he figured the series a tossup.

Largest crowds of the season are expected to witness the two tilts, with officials predicting a capacity throng for the Saturday after-dark game and a near-full stand Sunday.
