



The 47-year-old monarch, who had visited the United States several times, had been in poor health for years. During a five-month stay in America in 1931 he underwent an eye operation at Johns Hopkins hospital in

Baltimore. The five-foot king, who ruled from 1925 to 1935, had resided quietly in England with his exqueen Rambai-Barni since giv-ing up his throne. They had 40 servants and lived off an income from Thailand estimated at \$1,-500,000.
