

GUNTER GRANTED COURT CLEMENCY IN SLAPPING CASE

C. L. Gunter, charged with assault and battery upon Mrs. Charles Painter of Central Point was granted an indefinite suspended sentence by Justice of the Peace W. R. Coleman yesterday, following hearing of much testimony. Gunter was directed to stay away from the Painter house in the future.

Gunter, who lives on Coleman creek, called at the Painter home recently, and during the visit Ellen Landing, also present, said something that displeased him. The testimony showed he slapped her, and when Mrs. Painter intervened, he also slapped her, causing a discolored optic. It was not brought out what Miss Landing said.

Francis M. Glandy charged with driving an auto while intoxicated, entered a plea of guilty and was sentenced to serve 30 days in the county jail, pay \$100 fine, and suffer revocation of his driving and liquor licenses for one year. Glandy was committed to the county jail to serve out the fine and sentence.

Clarence Lilly, charged with reckless driving, who sustained a broken jaw in the accident upon which the charge is based, was granted 60 days before passing of sentence. By that time it is expected his broken jaw will be healed. The case has been pending for several weeks. Lilly entered a plea of guilty.

Circuit Judge H. K. Hanna will hold sessions next week, starting Monday in Grants Pass. Two or three cases are scheduled on the Josephine county docket.

Trial of two criminal cases, in which indictments were returned by the grand jury will start June 16.

MALE EARS KEENEST ASSERTS DR. HOWARD AT OSTEOPATH MEET

Tacoma, Wash., June 4.—(AP)—Dr. W. W. Howard of Medford, Ore., said here today that "as far as hearing is concerned, the male is certainly the stronger of the two sexes."

Dr. Howard spoke at the tri-state convention of the Washington, Oregon and British Columbia Osteopathic associations.

Statistics on large numbers of cases seem to indicate, he said, that women, especially those of middle age, have about a 15 percent greater chance of becoming deaf than do men.

Nevertheless, Dr. Howard reported, on the basis of world war draft figures, ear defects will cause the rejection of about 17,500 men out of the first 1,200,000 to be examined under the present selective service program.

So far in the present draft, he added, defects of the ears, nose and throat constitute the sixth leading cause of rejection, accounting for six percent of the turn-downs.

Dr. H. L. Chadwick of Spokane was elected president today by 200 osteopathic physicians attending the convention.

Clarence J. Baker of Seattle was chosen president-elect; Dr. Dorothy H. Wheeler of Wenatchee, vice president; Dr. H. F. Morse of Wenatchee, treasurer; and Dr. S. M. Pugh of Everett, secretary.
