Importance of Eugenics

Medical research, for many years, has continued ever to lengthen our expectancy of life.

Inhabitants of the world's most highly civilized country, Sweden, now, by sheer force of applied science, live practically double the years of the average Hindu.

We, however, have done very little in applied human genetics.

We take care of the improvement of everything from pigs to poultry, from prunes to potatoes, without thinking of human social inadequacies.

An example of this is haemophilia, a bleeding disease, prominent in European royal families, notably the Spanish, the Russian.

It passes from mother to son. An eminent historian recently declared that if a certain queen had not been a carrier of this disease, neither the Bolshevik revolution nor the Spanish Civil War would ever have commenced.

Humanity, despite this terrible war, stands at the threshold of marvellous progress because recent research has given us power to eliminate our weaklings, to accelerate the birth rate of our high powers.

Since we are a democracy, this must commence with every thinking citizen reading up on eugenics. Any good librarian will suggest worthwhile books.

ASHLANDERS WILL EYE 4TH PLANS

Ashland, June 4 (Sp.)—Plans thus far, covering this city's 1941 July fourth celebration will be reviewed by the executive committee here tonight, according to an announcement from John P. Daugherty, general chairman.

Arrangements are underway to accommodate an estimated 15,000 to 20,000 residents of southern Oregon and northern California, efforts being concentrated on a morning parade, an afternoon and evening rodeo and horse show and other events.

Because of lack of available space, there will be no carnival this year. The Ashland park board denied the use of the park on the ground that previous amusement companies seriously damaged the surrounding lawns and shrubs.

This year's rodeo and horse show will be staged on an arena built by the Ashland Trail Riders. Both riders and stock will be non-professional.

Sawdust Charcoal Unsatisfactory

Defense Metals Land at Tacoma

Gold Beach Door To Ore Supplies

Washington, D. C., June 4.—A very good contract with a Puget sound sawmill to make charcoal from hog fuel has gone sour.

The charcoal didn't work. Now, each month, an American Mail liner docks at Tacoma and discharges 500 tons of charcoal so fine that every time a burlap bag is dropped a veritable cloud of ink dust floats up.

This charcoal is made from the shells of coconuts and is exactly what the war department requires. The use of utilizing sawdust from northwestern sawmills was excellent until the domestic charcoal was tried.

When the army or navy wants a thing they want it regardless of civilian needs. The sawmill charcoal proving unsatisfactory, they turned to coconut shells; ordered 12,000 tons delivered this year. Ordered American Mail to bring in 1,200 tons. It was a big order and the little plants in the coconut groves of the Philippines are working day and night. The liner had to tie up at Manila until 500 tons were accumulated.

Fine and powdery, the stuff blows everywhere and the crew must go around with broom and dustpan cleaning up for a cargo of flour. Then the charcoal is railroaded to Los Angeles and placed in gas masks.

Another messy cargo is copper mat, also brought from the Philippines. The ore has been reduced to a powder and is taken to the smelter at Tacoma for treatment. Not so bad are the shipments of hemp for the navy, and the chrome ore, both of which land at Tacoma.

The maritime commission is considering having cargoes of raw rubber discharged at Portland, and this will probably be brought ashore. The rubber comes from Borneo, but as there is apprehension that the Japanese may become active it is being hurried out of the country to the Philippines and will be picked up and carried to the Pacific coast, probably Portland.

Dozens of freighters are being used to bring in material for the war effort. There is some protest that this is all taken at a low rate, whereas the food commercial business cannot be touched by American flag ships.

FOR contrast with the ore imports from the Far East consider this statement before the board of army engineers last week during an argument to improve the mouth of Rogue river at Gold Beach, Curry county. There are between one billion and four billion tons of ore tributary to Gold Beach and this runs from one per cent to 20 per cent quicksilver. Some day quicksilver production is expected to be a major industry in that region. There are great quantities of chrome, but there are ten times as much tonnage of manganese as of chrome. The manganese, it is asserted, runs 40 to 60 per cent. As for copper, now being bought by Reconstruction Finance corporation from Chile, there are mountains of this ore blocked out. But none of it can move without an outlet at Gold Beach and, discouraged at waiting, owners of 700,000,000 feet of Douglas fir and Port Orford cedar have let it go for taxes since 1939, according to F. W. Smith, sheriff of Curry county. With 60 per cent of the county owned by the federal government or the state, residents think something should be done by Uncle Sam.

ALSO go on watching Turkey. If Turkey elects to fight to bar the land route to Iraq and Suez to Hitler's armies, she will provide history with one of its heroic moments.

She may do it—but it doesn't seem probable.

AGAIN the war, so far as heavy fighting is concerned, is in a lull.

It is only a temporary lull. It can't last long. Time, at the moment, is on the side of the British, helping them to collect their forces for the stand they will have to make in the Near East and at Suez. The Germans will give them no more time than is necessary.

When the storm breaks again, it will be fierce.

No, Thanks

Bern (Sp.)—Kindly ladies who have been knitting industriously for Switzerland's soldiers have discovered they probably were breaking the law. Under rationing regulations, the soldiers are required to surrender clothing ration tickets for gifts as well as purchases. Many soldiers prefer, however, to keep their small number of cards for clothes of their own choice and have declined to surrender them for unsolicited gifts of home-made socks, mufflers and mittens.

INFORMED quarters in Rome somewhat more definite express the belief that Crete will be used as the springboard for new attacks on the triangle formed by the island of Cyprus, the Egyptian port of Alexandria and the Palestine port of Haifa (where the oil pipe line from Iraq's fields reaches the Mediterranean.)

In other words, a campaign to clean the British out of the Mediterranean.

IN Berlin, "authorized German sources" intimate without flattery saying so that Germany "will give France a free hand to repel any attempts by England or other powers on her sovereignty."

"Germany, although the victor, is ready to concede this sacred right and duty of every nation to the French themselves."

THAT is to say, the Germans are getting ready to "permit" France to fight Germany's enemies.

ABSD? Of course, ON ITS FACE, it is absurd.

What it MEANS is that Hitler has told the French to get in and fight the British.

The French, beaten, lacking patriotic leadership, their morale decayed, have no other course open to them than to jump when the master cracks the whip.

FROM London we learn today (Tuesday) that British observers expect Vichy to ask German "protection" for all French colonial possessions.

That puts the finger on Syria, where the Germans are reported to have landed sea-borne infantry with motorized equipment—proof, if true, of the declining striking power of the British fleet.

It is a tip also to go on watching Dakar, where French Africa juts far out into the Atlantic, affording a strikingly advantageous base from which German submarines and bombers can harry the British supply lines through the south Atlantic by way of the Cape of Good Hope.

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AIRCRAFT CO-OP IS COAST PLAN

Seattle, June 4.—(Sp.)—The Boeing Aircraft company announced last night that three huge west coast aircraft manufacturers would establish a "patriotic cooperative" to produce Boeing B17E bombers in all their plants.

Other firms affected will be the Douglas Aircraft company of Santa Monica, Cal., and the Vega Airplane company of Burbank, Cal. The Vega firm is a subsidiary of the Lockheed Aircraft company.

The announcement said each of the factories would turn out complete Boeing bombers and that several other manufacturers would be given sub-contracts. It explained that the cooperative was established to help meet the demand for the four-engine, long-range bombers designated by the war department as immediately necessary for national defense and for aid to Britain.
