

NEW METHODS GIVE DEFENSES HARDER STEEL

Los Angeles, U.P.—The metal industry is keeping pace with the demands of the national defense program by perfecting new and better methods of fabricating the steel used in the manufacture of airplanes, tanks, battleships and guns.

Research scientists have developed superior processes for hardening the surfaces of steel plates used in war armament and have discovered substitute alloys which are proving more efficient than metals previously used in war machinery.

William H. Eisenman, secretary of the American Society for Metals, disclosed that the great majority of the nation's leading metallurgists have been drafted to work on the perfection of new steel fabricating methods.

Eisenman said that highly satisfactory progress has been made in the attempt to improve metal fabricating.

Eisenman revealed that "shot blasting," formerly used only to harden surfaces of large springs in automobiles and locomotives, now is being applied to the smaller springs of motors in aircraft and other military transportation units.

"The shot blast bombards the metal parts with tiny steel balls," he said. "These hammer the surface to a hard, smooth finish which possesses great resiliency."

Ham Mushroom Scramble
Hashed Browned Potatoes

Ham Mushroom Scramble
4 tablespoons fat
1/2 cup chopped ham
1/2 cup diced celery
2 tablespoons minced onions
1 tablespoon chopped parsley
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon paprika
2 eggs, beaten (or 6 yolks)
1 cup milk
2/3 cup mushrooms (fresh or canned)

Meat fat in frying pan. Add and cook five minutes, ham, celery, onions and parsley. Pour in rest of ingredients, blended. Cook slowly and stir constantly until creamy.

Piquant Sauce (for Vegetables)
4 tablespoons mayonnaise
1/4 teaspoon minced onions
1/4 teaspoon minced sweet pickles
2 olives, finely chopped
1/4 teaspoon grated lemon rind
1 teaspoon lemon juice
1 tablespoon butter
Mix ingredients and blend into hot cooked vegetables.

Fresh Fruit, Flavored with Grape Juice
1 cup cubed peaches
1 cup cubed pears
1 cup cubed oranges
8 tablespoons granulated sugar
1/2 cup grape juice
Mix and chill ingredients and serve in glass dishes. Mint leaves give extra color. Mixture can be frozen.

SHIP OWNERS AGREE TO CONTRIBUTE HALF

Washington, June 6.—(AP)—Steamship owners and operators in the Atlantic and Gulfwise services have agreed to contribute 50 percent of their available tonnage of ships of 3,500 deadweight tons or more for transfer into emergency operations.

About 32 ships are involved in the transfers, which will be made as rapidly as possible, the commission said.
