Waterless Cooking Expert to Lecture Montgomery-Ward
H. C. Elmore, well-known authority on waterless cooking, will be in Medford next week and will give a talk and demonstration (both of which are open to the public) in Montgomery Ward's store.

When interviewed yesterday, Mr. Elmore was particularly enthusiastic about the new super-speed saucepan cooker he will demonstrate next week. "The facts on its speed are so incredible," said Mr. Elmore, "that I really question the advisability of your printing them. Believe

it or not—it actually cooks peas in one minute, carrots or string beans in 2½. When it comes to meats, it will make the toughest cuts tender, in time that's equally amazing—pork chops in 8 minutes, 3-lb. beef rib roast in 35 minutes, and fried chicken in 12."

Another new pressure-cooking device that Mr. Elmore will demonstrate next week (for the very first time) is a new pressure cooker that completely does away with all the bothersome clamps and bands usually associated with this type of cooking.

"Most important of all," Mr. Elmore said, "is the fact that all the food prepared in these demonstrations will be distributed then and there, to the women who attend. After all, the proof of the pudding is in the eating!"

3 NAVY FLIERS FALL TO DEATH
San Diego, Cal., June 7.—(P) —The navy reported today that three fliers were killed and one injured in a mid-air collision of two planes from the heavy cruiser Chester near San Clemente Island.

Naval authorities said the accident occurred late yesterday. The injured man was brought to the naval hospital here.

The deaths brought to 24 the number of naval aviation men who have died since January 1 in accidents involving San Diego-based planes.

The navy reported the injured man escaped possible death by parachuting to the ocean.

The bodies were recovered and brought to a mortuary here.

The dead were: Ensign Thomas H. Pepuni, 27, San Francisco.

Paul J. Burroughs, 20, radio-man third class, Albion, Iowa.

Otto H. Wilkennig, 25, radio-man, first class, Nebraska.

Ensign Jack R. Egan, who was rescued, was reported in a serious condition.
