

RADIO SET MODELS SHARPLY REDUCED BY DEFENSE NEED

Production May Also Be Slashed—Lack of Aluminum, Nickel And Copper.

New York, June 10.—(AP)—Defense has taken priority in the radio industry, too. No doubt, that will reflect itself in the new receivers you may want to buy.

With the new model season at hand, all indications point to sharp curtailment in the types offered. Roughly this figures out as a reduction by two-thirds in the new ones normally brought out.

In some instances last year's sets are being carried over. Even in new models no particular drastic design changes have been noted.

Furthermore, with an estimated 50,000,000 receivers now in use in this country, there has been some discussion of slashing present normal production on the theory that a set doesn't wear out like some devices. Its replacement could fall into the luxury class—at least as long as the old one works.

Elimination Is Key
Then there is the television receiver. It contains considerably more material than sound sets, and few are expected to be placed on the market for the time being. This, despite the official "go-ahead" given television.

Crux of the situation is aluminum. Allotment of this metal for civilian radio has been cut to 30 per cent of last year's. Other vital metals, including

nickel and copper, are getting into a similar category. Thus, the industry is forced to rely on substitutes, some of which result in lowered operating efficiency. In this connection, broadcasting, which uses many recordings with an aluminum base, is scouting around for other materials, even glass.

But the fact that the radio industry is confronted with the lack of certain civilian materials isn't affecting the equipment it is turning out for the government. Most factories are busier than ever meeting defense communication needs.

OREGON FARMERS REGAINING FEET

Washington, June 10.—(AP)—Oregon borrowers of the Farm Security administration are getting back on their feet, C. B. Baldwin, FSA chief, has informed Senator McNary (R-Ore.)

He said that at the first of the year the 3,131 rehabilitation borrowers had repaid \$2,387,312 of the \$5,292,726 outstanding loans. Much of the repaid amount was not due for four or five years, Baldwin added.

Average income of borrowers during 1940 was given as \$1,117, compared with \$942 in the year before they borrowed from FSA, an annual increase of 19 per cent. Average gain in net worth since entrance into the FSA program was reported as 29 per cent.

Baptist Leader Dies
Portland, June 10.—(AP)—Last rites were held here today for Dr. George Gladstone Laughlin, 72, founder of the Western Baptist Theological seminary in Portland, who died Saturday. The veteran Baptist minister was Oregon convention evangelist from 1924 to 1930.

GOVERNMENT WILL PAY FULL COST OF ROADS TO CAMPS

State Engineer Baldock Learns Oregon To Be Well Cared For in Road Plans.

Salem, June 10.—(AP)—Two-thirds of Oregon's 4,000 miles of federal aid highways will be included in the government's plan to hasten construction and improvements of strategic military roads, State Highway Engineer R. H. Baldock said today on his return from Washington, D. C.

The list of strategic highways in Oregon, already approved by the federal public roads administration and the war department, will be released in a few days, he said.

About one-third of the nation's 225,000 miles of federal aid roads will be classified as strategic military roads, but coastal states, because of their military importance, will have much larger percentages of their federal aid systems placed in this category.

Heavy Program
Identical bills sponsored by the roads committees of each house of congress provide that the government and states share equally the cost of improvement of strategic roads, but Baldock said he believed that his recommendation that the government pay two-thirds or three-fourths of the cost probably would be accepted.

"The program includes reconstruction of narrow and crooked sections of mountain highways, rebuilding of weak bridges, and improvements in congested areas through cities and towns," Baldock said.

The government also will pay the full cost of constructing access roads to naval and military reservations, such as the cantonments planned at Medford, Eugene and Bend; to industrial plants engaged in manufacture of defense materials, and to munitions dumps.

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EX-KAISER BURIED UNDER OWN RITES

Doorn. German-occupied Netherlands, June 10.—(AP)—Wilhelm II, former kaiser of Imperial Germany, was buried at noon Monday with rites which he arranged himself 40 years ago.

He died here Wednesday at the age of 82 after almost 23 years of exile following his flight from Germany in the last days of the World war.

Far from Potsdam, whence he once ruled a mighty empire, his burial nevertheless was linked symbolically, at least, with his fatherland. The Rev. Bruno Doehring, once Wilhelm's court preacher, officiated at the rites and sprinkled the former Kaiser's coffin with earth from the temple of Sans Souci Park at Potsdam where his first wife, Auguste Viktoria, lies buried.
