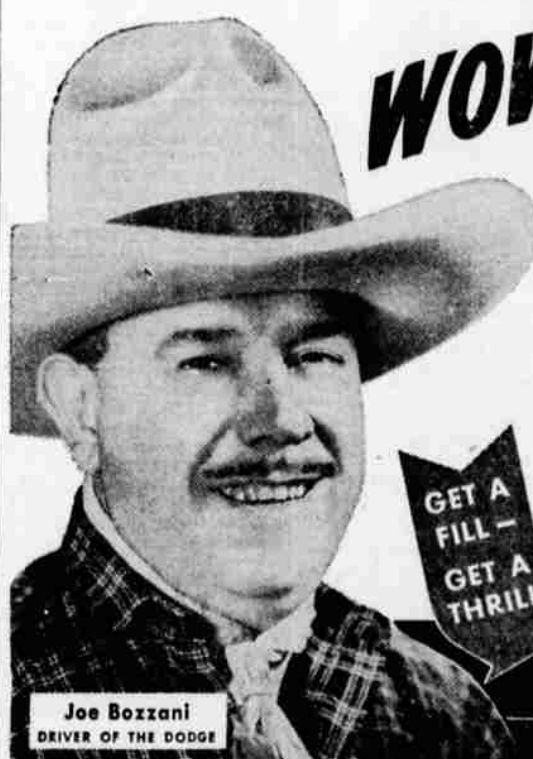
RECKLESS DRIVER GIVEN \$50 FINE
