

FOREST IS READY FOR USE NOW OF PLEASURE SEEKERS

The following recreational bulletin was issued today by Rogue River national forest headquarters:

"Conditions in the Rogue River national forest are now favorable for recreational use. The main-travelled roads are in good condition, although the Ashland loop, Herschberger, and Abbott Butte roads are still blocked with snow. Flowering shrubs are at their best. Mountain ash, mock orange, California lilac, and ocean spray are blooming profusely throughout the forest; along the Tiller-Trail highway many rhododendrons may be seen. All camps accessible by road are ready for use.

"Fishing is good in most parts of the forest. In the Union Creek district spinners and periwinkles, and brown hackle and red ant flies are successful in both Rogue river and the smaller streams. In fish lake still fishing is good, while only small catches are being made by trolling. Most anglers at Four Mile lake are getting limit catches and boats are available for rent there now. At Lake O'Woods, black bass, silversides and perch may be caught in fair numbers and catfish are biting well in the evenings.

"With the close of the fire training camp at Carberry this evening, most of the fire guards and lookouts are going to their stations for the summer. Hot sun and east winds are rapidly drying out the forest cover and forest visitors are urged to use care with campfires, matches and smoking materials. Do an honest job of putting out your campfire—wet it down with water and stir it with your hand to be sure it is cold and don't be a cigarette "flipper." Then you will be sure that you have never caused any part of the 40-million-dollar loss that occurs each year in the United States from forest fires."

New York, June 13.—(AP)—Joe Louis will knock out Billy Conn in about three rounds next Wednesday night at the Polo grounds. If it goes longer than that, Billy will be just plain lucky.

This is said after a personal tour of inspection of the champion's training camp at Greenwood lake, just up the Hudson, where the large negro is getting ready to defend his championship.

There has been considerable talk about Louis being worn out by his strenuous campaign of the past spring, during which he has fought more often than necessary. It has been said and believed that Joe has turned into an old man.

There is nothing to it, folks. This Joe Louis still is the greatest fighting man you or I will see in a lifetime. He has taken them all on, one after the other, and it is your argument against mine when you say Jack Dempsey or Gene Tunney could have whipped him.

What makes it worse for Conn, a mere light-heavyweight trying to fight a big man, is that Louis is not feeling friendly about this fight. Joe reads the papers, and he has noted that Conn repeatedly has referred to him as a "dumb negro" and an "old man." While Louis realizes that a "ghost writer" has been responsible for these remarks, he still feels that Conn has condoned them, and he is sore about it. He intends to knock Billy on his head—quickly.

"You know I don't try to name no rounds," he said before he went into the ring. "I'd rather not. But I'll get him quick as I can."

Joe danced around some more, shadow-boxing. He was asked if he intended, by any chance, to take it easy and try to out-box Conn.

"No sir," Joe said emphatically. "None of that backing up like I did against Red Burman. I'll get him the first round if I can. How long you guess it will take?"

"Two rounds, maybe."

"You think so?" Joe said quickly. "I hope you're right."
