

CATFISH DERBY AT BYBEE BRIDGE TO OPEN AT 1:30 P. M.

Continued Entertainment Is Promised Through Afternoon — Long Prize List

The fifth annual national catfish derby, sponsored this year by the Medford 20-30 club, will start at Bybee bridge at 1:30 p. m. sharp Sunday, and from then until 4 o'clock, close of the derby, there will be a steady stream of entertainment events for the huge crowd expected to be on hand for the fish pageant.

With Frank DeSouza acting as master of ceremonies, the entertainment program will open with several selections by Mrs. Harry Prentice's accordion band.



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Judge F. L. TouVelle will crown the queen of the derby at 2 o'clock, following which the kiltie band of the Ashland American Legion will play several numbers.

Attorney George M. Roberts will give a patriotic address at 2:30, and from 3 to 4 a large number of prizes, donated by local merchants, will be awarded for events to be announced later.

At 4 o'clock sharp the derby will officially end, and the catfish caught by the competitors will be weighed, measured and judged, and the winners announced. The fish may be caught anywhere and any time between 1:30 and 4, but they must be landed before the latter hour, officials have pointed out. Prizes will be given for the largest catch by a three-man team, the largest fish and the longest fish.

Judges of the derby will be F. L. TouVelle, Frank Perl, Kenneth Anthony, Mayor H. S. Deuel, Sheriff Syd I. Brown, Robert W. Ruhl, George M. Roberts and Charles C. Furnas.

CHERRY PRICE IS 5 CTS. AT BAGLEY

Ashland, June 18. — (Sp.) — Ralph Koozer, manager of the Bagley Canning company, stated today that his company is paying five cents a pound for royal Anne, Bing and Lambert cherries, the price his company has paid from the beginning of the season. He added that no change in the price was contemplated. The cannery is still receiving cherries and barrelling is proceeding at the plant.

Mr. Koozer said that confusion had resulted from a Mail Tribune story Monday that the price was around five cents for Bings, with royal Annes at six cents.

Rain thus far has done no serious damage to the cherry crop, so far as his receipts indicate, Mr. Koozer said.

FORMER CASHIER GETS 2 YEARS, \$19,000 FINE

crease fire insurance rates. Councilman J. C. Collins pointed out that application for permits would have to be made to the chief and Mr. Elliott replied that he would not issue any but he indicated his fear that nonetheless such storage might be done without his consent.

Emergency Action
It was explained that the ordinance was prepared because the existing one governing firecrackers had been accidentally omitted in the recent correlation of all the city's ordinances. Because of the lack of an existing ordinance on the matter, an emergency was declared so that the new ordinance became effective upon adoption.

Reporting for the land appraisal committee, Harold Frye, chairman, recommended sale of the following city-owned lots: Lot 22, block 2, Kenwood addition, to E. R. Davis for the appraised price of \$175, the lot being on West Palm street near Columbus avenue; lot 5, consolidated No. 2, to Hobart M. Price for \$500, the lot being on Portland avenue; lots 6 and 7, block 2, Palm addition, to J. V. McGowan for \$600, the lots being on Palm street a block west of Oakdale avenue; and lot 1, block 2, amended plat of Euclid Park addition, to John W. McCabe for \$300, the lot being on Hillcrest road. The council approved the sales.

Three Lots Rented
Three lots on North Riverside avenue were rented at \$15 a year each to Foster & Kleiser for signboards, it being stipulated that the signs could be removed at any time and the agreement cancelled upon ten days' notice from the city.

From a list certified by the city civil service commission, the council employed H. V. Martin as a houseman in the fire department to replace Vernon Woods who recently re-enlisted in the navy. Martin, highest on the civil service list, has been a volunteer fireman for some time.

On recommendation of the airport committee, the council sanctioned the purchase of 20 acres of land at the airport from Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Ivie for \$3,625. The land is needed in the general airport expansion now under way, Mr. Collins, committee chairman explained.

387 Planes Use Port
In May 387 planes used the municipal airport, it was shown in a report submitted by Thomas A. Culbertson, Jr., airport superintendent, and read by Mr. Collins. The planes were classified as follows: 207 United Air Lines, 133 U. S. army and 27 private.

Councilman Frank J. Runtz read a comprehensive May work report of the various city departments as prepared by Fred W. Scheffel, city superintendent.

On the advice and consent of the council, M. N. Hogan, acting mayor, re-appointed Paul B. Rynning to the city water commission for a five-year term and C. E. Borg to the board of appeals as successor to the late R. I. Stuart.

Mayor H. S. Deuel and City Attorney Frank P. Farrell were absent.

LOG TRUCKS TO STOP AT TRACKS

Salem, June 18. — (Sp.) — All trucks carrying logs in the state of Oregon must come to a complete stop before crossing any railroad track at grade from today on, said Ormond R. Bean, state public utilities commissioner, in a pronouncement affecting thousands of log carriers.

The time logs are removed from the highway, when dropped or lost, must be contained in the carriers' reports to the highway commission. Also, logging trucks are prohibited against hauling logs, poles or piling on Saturday afternoons; on Sundays; during the hours of darkness and on the following holidays: January 1, May 30, July 4, Labor Day November 11 and December 25.
