ANGLING DUEL BY 20-30 CHIEFS IS CATFISH FEATURE

Newly-Elected Governor Monaco to Vie With Predecessor Davis for Laurels

One of many personal angling duels scheduled to take place at the fifth annual national catfish derby at Bybee bridge Sunday afternoon will be that between Eugene Monaco, newly-elected district governor of 20-30 clubs in the northwest district, and Wes Davis, whom he succeeded to the post.

Eugene, who issued the challenge which was accepted, believes that his one year of fishing experience will enable him to easily outdistance Wes, who has catfished in the Portland vicinity for several years. Monaco is a great believer in the adage, "beginner's luck," and feels his fishing efforts will return him the victor.

Many Entries
The local 20-30 club, which is sponsoring this year's derby, reports that many entries have been received thus far and more are expected before the starter's gun at 1:30 sharp Sunday. A group of Klamath Falls 20-30 anglers have announced they will be on hand to "show up" the local 20-30 members, and a team from Bend also is expected to compete. Anglers from all parts of southern Oregon will try their luck during the derby. Entrants need only take their catfish to the judges' stand at 4 o'clock, there being no blanks to fill in or other red tape to bother with.

Jack Hartley, in charge of the grounds at the derby site, has been busy getting the grass cut for the thousands of spectators expected to attend, arranging for a stage and the construction of the queen's stage, and for a public address system.

Miss Colleen Winterhalter, in charge of the queen and her royal court, said today their names would be disclosed tomorrow. She said her dance pupils and friends had aided her

very much in arranging for the queen and her court.

APPLE JUICE PIE

Mixture No. 1: One (12 oz.) can Apple Juice; one cup sugar; one tablespoon butter; 1/4 teaspoon salt; 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon; 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg; 1/2 teaspoon lemon juice. Mixture No. 2: 3 tablespoons cornstarch; 3 egg yolks. Take 1 cup Mixture No. 1 and dissolve cornstarch; add egg yolks. Stir all together and cook until thickened. Place in baked pie shell and cover with whites of eggs to which 2 tablespoons of sugar have been added. Brown in oven.

PASTRY

1 c. flour
1 c. shortening
Combine shortening with flour and salt in large flakes. With a knife, cut in the water until it holds its shape. This makes 4 shells.

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
