

FUND TO FOSTER RADICAL ISSUES NOW LIQUIDATED

**\$900,000 Given by Charles
Garland From Father's
Bequest Lasts 20 Years**

New York, June 20.—(P)—A half-dozen men and women met in an obscure Irving Place cafeteria, okayed a \$2,000,000 balance sheet and shook hands—disbanding the American Fund for Public Service, Inc., which for two decades had supported controversial movements.

In contrast to the birth of the fund in 1922, which stood the country on its ear, the demise yesterday was quiet. It died in its sleep.

Inheritance Refused
Charles Garland, now 40,

created the fund with an inheritance he refused to accept. He said then he didn't deserve the \$900,000 his banker-father bequeathed him, and he turned it over to a liberal-red-pink board of trustees, declining even to join in its administration.

The market boom of the late '20's more than doubled the value of the original bequest, and for years the fund grew despite hard-over-first disbursements to strikers, political movements, negro colleges, unions, publications and a wide variety of other "causes."

During the last 19 years, \$1,987,711.73 was given away or sunk in "loans," mostly bad. Between \$2,000 and \$3,000 will be returned to Garland, when liquidation is complete.

Would Do It Again
"The trustees did a much better job than I could do," Garland said. "If I had it to do over again, I don't know that I'd be as dogmatic as I was in disposing of this fortune—but I suppose I'd do pretty much the same thing."

"I think I've gotten more out of my inheritance this way. I think that the person who lives like the average man gets more

Cull Peaches 75 Cents Each, Rated Bargain by Londoners

London, June 19.—(P)—The coming of warm weather and ripening of fruit brought some rare bargains in London's crowded markets today.

One store had a shelf of peaches which a Georgia grower wouldn't bother to send to market and the price was 75 cents each.

"Yes sir," said a clerk, "we've sold quite a few. There's nothing like a fresh peach, you know."

Lots of strawberries—knotty little specimens—were on display at another store for sale at \$3.80 a pound.

A shop offered unrationed

cheese from Wisconsin at \$1 a pound.

"It's straight from America," the clerk said, "and shoppers like it mighty well."

Tomatoes have come down. You could get them at many places for \$1 a pound.

String beans sold for 90 cents a pound.

Canned grapefruit, which also has been hard to find, was offered at 50 cents a can, but the seller said you had to take two cases.

Garland, whose youth was highlighted by personal and financial escapades, lives quietly with his second wife and four children in Mount Vernon, N. Y., where he spends much of his time working for the farm research cooperative.

He said executors of his father's will "saw to it" that he could not spend or give away all his money.

**WAGE PACT SIGNED
FOR COAL MINERS**

Washington, June 20.—(P)—Northern soft coal producers and the United Mine Workers union signed a two-year wage agreement providing vacations with pay and wage increases for miners in the northern Appalachian fields.

The conclusion of the agreement as a result of negotiations begun early last March put into permanent effect the temporary agreements raising the day wage rate in the north from \$6 to \$7 and corresponding increases for miners paid on a tonnage basis.

**PITTSBURGHER IS
NEW KIWANIS HEAD**

Atlanta, Ga., June 20.—(P)—Charles S. Donley, 55, Pittsburgh transportation consultant, is the new president of Kiwanis International. Cleveland was selected as the 1942 convention city.

Announcement was also made of the election of two new vice-presidents, a treasurer and seven trustees. They will serve the organization during the remainder of 1941 and the first half of 1942.

Dr. Charles B. Holman of St. Louis, and Fred G. McAllister, London, Ont., Canada, were elected vice presidents and Donald B. Price of Oakland, Calif., treasurer.

"We will support a militant rather than a military attitude," the new president said. "We should find a program of service to fit into the present war period, keeping in mind our slogan 'Building'."

OLSON SIGNS MEASURE ALIGNING CALIFORNIA WITH SOCIAL SECURITY

Sacramento, Calif., June 20.—(P)—Gov. C. L. Olson signed 11 emergency bills today, including legislation designed to bring the California law into conformity with federal requirements for aid to thousands of needy aged, blind persons and dependent children.

The federal social security board informed the state that it faced the loss of \$38,000,000 annually in federal grants after July 1, unless California agreed to revise its standards and provisions for the categorical aid program.

The new regulations provide in part that aid to the aged

cannot exceed \$40 a month, inclusive of other regular income except on the basis of actual need. The recipients have been permitted up to \$15 a month in exempt outside income. A limit of \$50 a month is placed on payments to the blind.

The legislation to end the federal-state dispute becomes effective immediately.

**NAZI WAR MACHINE
WORTH HUGE SUM**

Washington, June 20.—(P)—A defense official rated the value of the Nazi war machine today "in excess of \$100,000,000,000" and said that the United States might have to pour out a comparable amount before Germany was beaten.

Joseph L. Trecker of the de-

fense contract service said he hoped that this country would not have to meet Germany's military might, but he added, "we have got to be prepared to go the route alone if necessary, and that may well require an expenditure in excess of \$100,000,000,000."

Addressing a conference of the service's field representatives yesterday, Trecker pointed out that less than half of the

nation's \$44,000,000,000 defense program was "on the dotted line."

Need Caretakers

Montgomery, Ala. (U.S.)—The state military department is appointing 36 caretakers to look after as many national guard armories during the next year while the state's guardsmen are in federal service for a year's training.
