

CROWD EXPECTED AT CATFISH DERBY THIS AFTERNOON

Entertainment Features For Spectators as Anglers Vie—Movies Are Planned

The fifth annual national catfish derby, which takes place at 1:30 this afternoon at Bybee bridge on the Rogue river, may become an official project of the national association of 20-30 clubs.

H. D. Wiley, a member of the Medford 20-30 club, which is sponsoring this year's catfish derby, plans to take five reels of 8-mm motion pictures of the colorful event and display them at the national 20-30 club convention in Salt Lake City in August. There an attempt will be made to put the annual derby over as a national 20-30 club project and Wiley is of the opinion that such will be done.

The motion pictures will depict the actual derby competition, with anglers from all parts of southern Oregon fishing for catfish; the 5,000 expected spectators; the coronation of the beautiful little queen, 12-year-old Mary Adele Kane, with her 21 young attendants; the coronation ceremony and other features of the event.

The 20-30 club said yesterday that five members of the Bend 20-30 club had telegraphed they would be on hand for the derby and that a large number of competitors were expected from Grants Pass, Klamath Falls, Ashland, Medford, Central Point and other southern Oregon towns.

The derby will close at 4 p. m. sharp, at which time all contestants must have their catfish at the judging stand to be in line for one of the three prizes offered—for the largest catch by a team, for the largest catfish and for the longest catfish.

During the derby, there will be a series of entertainment events designed to keep the spectators amused.

Mr. Ross was born on the Colonel John E. Ross ranch on Ross Lane, May 14, 1888, the eldest son of Anna and the late Thomas D. Ross.

Later the family moved to Central Point where he received his education in the public schools, also attending Ashland Normal school. On Nov. 27, 1913 he was married to Etta Williams.

They moved to Grants Pass in 1919 where Mr. Ross had been actively engaged in the hardware business until the last year when ill health forced him to dispose of his business interests.

He was preceded in death by his wife, Etta who passed away March 13, 1938. Surviving are his daughter, Janet, Grants Pass; his mother, Mrs. Anna Shipley Ross, Central Point; a sister, Mrs. Clatous McCredie, Medford; two brothers, James C. Ross, Central Point and Floyd A. Ross, Prineville, Ore.

A man of sterling character and principles, Mr. Ross leaves, besides his relatives, a host of friends to mourn his death. Funeral services will be held at the L. B. League of Women Voters Sponsors Talk by Cantonment Architect, Educator

Plans have been completed for two public meetings here this week, sponsored by the Jackson County League of Women Voters as part of a national campaign to stimulate interest in national defense.

The first will be tomorrow evening at the courthouse auditorium when Myron S. Hunt, architect for the proposed army cantonment here, will speak. Dr. Frank Munk of Reed College, Portland, will speak at the second meeting, to be held Friday evening in the courthouse auditorium.

Mr. Hunt will explain what plans the citizens of the city and county should make in preparation for the cantonment. His talk will be supplemented by Mrs. Hunt, who was active in recreational work for soldiers and sailors stationed at California camps and ports in World War I.

World Crisis Topic
"The World Crisis—A Challenge and an Opportunity," will be Dr. Munk's address title. Dr. Munk, native of Czechoslovakia, is an economist and lecturer well known in this state and his previous appearances in Medford have been before large audiences. Both meetings are to be at 8 p. m.

The campaign to arouse public interest in "the battle of production" had its inception in the national council of the league and is being conducted on a nation-wide scale. In a message to league members and the general public Miss Marguerite M. Wells, national president, said "management, labor, military and civilian services, congress and the president are all factors in winning the battle of production, but the determining factor is every man's will to win."

Slogan for the campaign is "Do everything to help—say nothing to hinder the battle of production for defense at home, and abroad, to keep free people free."

WALL ST. SHOWS STEADIER SIGNS

New York, June 21.—(AP)—The stock market today finished a desultory week with tendencies toward steadiness.

While plus and minus signs were pretty evenly divided at the close of the brief proceedings, it was noted that many pivotal issues emerged with modest advances.

It was one of the slowest sessions of the past year, transfers of 125,200 shares, comparing with 193,620 a week ago. The turnover actually was the smallest since May 31. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was unchanged at 41.4, the exact figure at which it started last Monday. A month ago the composite stood at 39.8 and a year ago at 41.2.

GARAGE AWARDED AUTO AND \$35.20

A circuit court jury, George B. Eichenhower, Ashland, foreman, late Friday returned a verdict awarding the Medford Garage possession of an Oldsmobile auto and \$35.20 damages, in a suit against George W. Field. The jury deliberated slightly less than two hours. The trial lasted three days.

The \$35.20 damages were awarded for Fields' "taking and withholding of the automobile." The plaintiff sought \$2,000 punitive damages, \$500 general damages, and \$15 per day for the period in which the auto was held. The jury placed the value of the auto at \$1,280.

The controversy was based upon a trade-in deal last fall.

ARMY AIR CORPS SEEKS RECRUITS

Offering young men who have had two or more years in college an opportunity for examination for the army air corps, a traveling army examining board will be at the Del Norte hotel in Grants Pass Monday from 8:30 a. m. to 4:30 p. m. and in Klamath Falls on Tuesday and Wednesday, at army recruiting headquarters.

Those seeking entry as flying cadets must be 20 to 26 years of age, inclusive; unmarried and have excellent health and character.

Flying cadets are paid \$75 monthly with an additional \$1 daily ration allowance. On graduation and commissioning as second lieutenant, air corps reserve with rating of pilot, the salary jumps to \$205.50 per month with living quarters, or if quarters are unavailable the sum received will be \$245.50.

WHEAT UP ABOUT CENT A BUSHEL

Chicago, June 21.—(AP)—Wheat moved up about a cent a bushel in moderate trading in today's short session, deriving strength from soy bean and lard quotations, which advanced to new high marks for the season and to the best levels in four years.

Lack of hedging sales at the slightly lower opening encouraged professional buying in the wheat pit. Some purchases by milling interests were also reported. However, demand remained comparatively cautious in view of trade reports that larger receipts are expected at southwestern terminals at the start of next week.
