

Louis-Conn Fight Films With Rollicking "Pot O' Gold" Hit at Craterian

THIRTEEN ROUND THRILLER SHOWN IN SPECIAL FILM

James Stewart, Paulette Goddard in "Pot O' Gold" Leads on Same Bill.

With the official Joe Louis-Billy Conn fight pictures as a special added attraction on the same program, "Pot O' Gold", starring James Stewart and Paulette Goddard, with Horace Heidt and His Musical Knights and Charles Winninger topping the supporting cast, opens a three day run today at the Craterian theatre.

Easily the outstanding heavyweight championship battle in recent years, a fight that almost saw a new champion crowned, the Louis-Conn fight pictures have evoked more comment than any shown here since the memorable battle in which Schmeling knocked out Louis before he became champ. Young Billy Conn, the fighter who almost upset the "dope bucket" and had the championship within his grasp, only to become careless and get knocked out in the 13th round, is shown battering the famous Brown Bomber from pillar to post, "dishing it out" with a grin on his handsome face. All important blows and knockdowns are shown in slow motion.

The fight pictures, filmed at the Polo Grounds in New York Wednesday night, were rushed to Portland by air express and from there sent to Medford, giving sport fans here a "scoop" attraction.

"Pot O' Gold", the last picture Jimmy Stewart will be shown in for quite some time, now that he's in the army, is based on the sensational radio program that had millions of Americans excitedly waiting for a thousand dollar telephone call every week. Made into a comedy-romance, with Horace Heidt's music thrown in for good measure, the picture shows what complications can ensue when a young man with ideas takes over a stagnant radio program.

MUSSOLINI AIDE RAPS ROOSEVELT

Rome, June 21.—(P)—Vittorio Gayda, authoritative fascist spokesman, declared that Washington had "created a perfect break" between the United States and the axis powers, which meant "continental Europe."

"An economic war and a partial diplomatic war between the two continents has already opened," he wrote in the newspaper Il Giornale d'Italia, of which he is the editor.

Describing June as "undoubtedly a month of notable political clarifications," Gayda said "everything which may still happen between Europe and the United States is the exclusive responsibility of the American government, which has taken the initiative of unprovoked aggression and has carried it boldly to the present advanced limit."

He declared that "strong and aggressive language used by President Roosevelt in a message to congress on the sinking of the S. S. Robin Moor May 21 on her voyage to Capetown, South Africa, would not be possible in formal diplomatic usage except in an ultimatum."

Berlin Loss Claim
Berlin, June 21.—(P)—Six British merchantmen and a catapult plane-equipped auxiliary cruiser—altogether 52,900 tons of shipping—were sunk by submarines recently in the north Atlantic, the German high command declared today.
