Wall St. Report

New York, June 23.—(P)—A brisk wave of buying swept through securities and sensitive raw staple markets today, as Wall street interpreted the Russo-German conflict as diverting Nazi pressure from Britain. Save for continued bidding for a few commodities, however, the buying excitement was short lived, and dealings slackened after the first hour, although a good part of the price rise was retained.

The early bulge was one of the sharpest in speculative markets since the outbreak of the European war nearly two years ago.

Cotton for futures delivery jumped around \$1 to \$1.50 a bale.

Cottonseed oil, up around ¼ of a cent a pound, touched the best prices in 15 years. Hogs at Chicago reached the best prices since 1937; wheat futures jumped as much as 4 cents a bushel, and finished with gains of 2½ to 2½ over Saturday.

Wall street quickly turned cautious after the first buying enthusiasm.
