ROTARY LEADER IRKS CANADIANS

Camrose, Alta., June 24.—(CP)—The Camrose Rotary club decided at a meeting last night to "stand adjourned" in protest against a statement reportedly made by T. J. Davis of Butte, Mont., international president, at the Rotary annual convention in Denver last week.

Mr. Davis was reported to have closed proceedings with a plea that Rotary abstain from identifying itself with any "ideology of governments" involved in the war.

On the basis of press reports on Mr. Davis' plea, the Camrose club sent a protest to Rotary International headquarters and decided until the meaning of the statement is clarified, the Camrose club will not meet.

NIPPON SYMPATHY LIES WITH NAZIS

New York, June 24.—(P)—Domel, the authoritative Japanese news agency, said in a broadcast from Tokyo that today's comments of the Japanese press "are much clearer in their manifestations of sympathy for Germany and in indicating the future course of Japan's policy."

The agency, which has close government connections, quoted this comment from the newspaper Kokumin:

"The line of (Japan's) policy has been laid down in principle. It is natural that Japan, in the spirit of the three-powers pact, is cooperating with Germany and Italy, which are engaged in the reconstruction of Europe."

CCC BOY'S NECK BROKEN BY CAR

Lakeview, Ore., June 24.—(P)—Roy W. Pitcher, 17, Camp Alkali lake CCC enrollee, died of a broken neck last night shortly after he was struck by a car driven by Merrill C. Reynolds, Lakeview.

Pitcher was walking on the road a mile south of camp with Donald MacGregor, another enrollee, bucking a strong head wind. As they heard the car, MacGregor jumped to the right but Pitcher ran across the road and was struck and hurled 15 feet.

A coroner's jury decided today that the accident was unavoidable. Pitcher is survived by his parents and an uncle at Walden, Ky.

PARK SERVICE SHIFTS BRINGS NEW DIRECTOR OVER FOURTH REGION

Washington, June 24.—(P)—Owen A. Tomlinson, superintendent of Mount Rainier National park, has been named director of region four in the national park service, Interior Secretary Harold Ickes announced today.

This region embraces Washington, Oregon, Idaho, California and Nevada, with headquarters in San Francisco.

Tomlinson's position as superintendent of Mount Rainier will be taken by John C. Preston, present superintendent of Lassen Volcanic national park, Cal.

Tomlinson replaces John R. White, who asked to be returned to his old position as superintendent of Sequoia (Calif.) national park, said Ickes.

Eleven shifts in field personnel of the national park service were announced by Ickes, who said the immediate cause of most of the changes was the death on April 30 of Arnold B. Cammerer, director of region one with headquarters in Richmond, Va.

ARMY OF POLICEMEN HUNTS MAD SLAYER; WIDOW NEW VICTIM

Seattle, June 24.—(P)—Thirteen automobile loads of patrolmen, armed with shotguns and under orders of "shoot to kill" hunted today for a mad slayer, after a former Chicago widow was found slain in the neighborhood where yesterday a man was shot to death, his wife seriously wounded and another man was critically shot and beaten.

An autopsy indicated the latest victim, Mrs. Blanche H. Link, 33, New Washington hotel telephone operator, was overtaken as she walked home from the end of a north side bus line about 11:30 p. m. She was dragged about 65 feet into a ferny undergrowth and raped; garrotted apparently with one of

War Observer Killed

London, June 24.—(P)—First Lieut. Follett Bradley, Jr., of the U. S. army air corps, was killed two days ago in a training flight accident in northern England. It was announced today. The United States embassy reported he had been in England about a month as a military observer.

M'NARY FOR CHANGES IN MEASURE FORMING COLUMBIA AUTHORITY

Washington, June 24.—(P)—Senator McNary (R-Ore.) told interviewers today that there were several matters in the administration bill (H. R. 5129), to create a Columbia power authority under the interior department, which he wanted to change. It was introduced yesterday by Representative Hill (D-Wash.), at Interior Secretary Ickes' request.

Senator Bone (D-Wash.) was away to attend the funeral of Senator Pat Harrison, but is known here to oppose the Ickes bill. He and McNary have been working on a Columbia power authority bill. Bone has prepared a preliminary draft of features he believes it should contain.

McNary said he wants to revise the taxation section of the administration bill to provide that when the authority takes over public utilities, the states and counties of Washington and Oregon would not lose any taxes they now collect from the utilities.

He said he wants also to revise the irrigation feature so power rates at Bonneville will not have to be increased to provide for irrigation expenses at Grand Coulee.
