AUTO TRACKS ARE TRIAL EVIDENCE

Hearing of testimony continued today in the circuit court trial of John Warner of Elk Creek, on a charge of larceny of livestock, with Evan Hartin, livestock investigator, on the stand for the prosecution. Molds of auto tires, made at the Alex Oliver ranch following the killing of stock, were introduced and identified. Other state exhibits included a rifle, the tires on the car in which the stolen cow is claimed to have been hauled, and photographs.

The state holds the auto belonged to Robert Morgan, jointly indicted with Warner. The sheriff's office reports Morgan has been traced through California and Arizona, without apprehending him.

The state has called 13 witnesses, including a ballistic expert from Portland. Most of the courtroom spectators were from the Trail-Elk creek district, where the case has attracted considerable interest.
