

RUSSIAN UNITY TO SAVE COUNTRY IS KERENSKY'S PLEA

Former Leader Says Country
Weak, Stalin Bankrupt—
Reds in U.S. Ask Support

New York, June 24.—(AP)—Pessimistic of Russia's chances with Germany, Alexander Kerensky, once head of the invaded nation, urges Russians of all political creeds to unite to save the country.

Kerensky, who 24 years ago helped overthrow the czarist regime and briefly headed the provisional government until the bolshevik revolution forced him to flee, says his country is weak and Joseph Stalin bankrupt.

"Russia stands face to face with Hitler's Panzer divisions," he said yesterday. "She cannot expect direct assistance from anyone. Nevertheless, we Russian patriots are grateful to Prime Minister Churchill for his promise of giving the Russian people whatever help may be within the power of England."

He said Russians were deprived of the fruits of victory in the last World war by the "so-called revolutionary aims" of Lenin, but that the country's position today was "even more tragic."

United States
Communist party leaders in the United States declared the homeland was "waging a struggle for the cause of the freedom of all nations" and asked Americans to give full support to the soviet union.

A joint statement issued by William Z. Foster, party chairman, and Robert Minor, acting party secretary, also called upon American workers to oppose all "those reactionaries of every stripe who seek in any manner to aid Hitler's attack against the soviet union."

The Daily Worker, formerly official organ of the American communist party and frequent reflector of official party views since its purchase by private publishers last year, carried no editorial comment on the German invasion but printed the Foster statement in full.

The newspaper's page one had this banner line over the lead story: "Will crush foe," Molotov says, calls nazi war a wanton act." A summary of Winston Churchill's address yesterday also was carried.

Niagara Cheated By Brave Officer

Niagara Falls, N. Y., June 24.—(AP)—A daring rescue near the brink of Niagara Falls was staged today by Patrolman Joseph Klein when he saw a woman, identified as Margaret Elmer, 55, Niagara Falls, retired school teacher, being swept toward the American rapids by the swift upper river current.

Klein seized a life rope and waded into the river while volunteers held the other end of the rope on shore. He grabbed her by the arm about 200 feet from the brink of the falls and both were hauled to safety.

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Hitler's Insincerity in Treaties Lines up With Mein Kampf Words

Required re-reading for this week in Moscow, Rome, Tokyo and elsewhere is Chapter XIV, Mein Kampf, by Adolf Hitler. One wonders, too, if Hitler is not re-reading it himself in some humiliation.

Contrary to some impressions, Mein Kampf has not turned out to be a precise chartbook for Hitler, for Hitler has betrayed himself, by reason of necessity or convenience, in various respects: for instance, in his expressed desire for an alliance with Britain as well as Italy.

The Russians, however, can now weigh the utter insincerity, from the beginning, of the treaty which Hitler made with them when he had to detour from his course. For Mein Kampf not only dismisses as worthless any treaty with Russia ("we must not forget that the international Jew, who today rules Russia absolutely, sees in Germany not an ally but a state marked for the same destiny . . . one does not conclude a treaty with someone whose sole interest is the destruction of his partner.")

The book also, by constant repetition, drives home this thought: "neither western nor eastern orientation should be the future goal of our foreign policy, but an eastern policy signifying the acquisition of the necessary soil for our German people."

Well, Hitler, having failed to knock out England, has gone back to the book and gone after the "necessary soil," and the danger for his foes on the west lies in the chance that he will be able to carve that soil out of the heart of the Russian richlands in six, or eight, or twelve weeks; encircle and destroy the Russian army and turn back again in the direction of England.

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ASHLAND C-C TO AID IN HANDLING JULY 4TH THROG

Ashland, June 24.—(Sp.)—Local chamber of commerce offices in the city hall will be kept open all day July 4 to assist visitors and tourists, it was stated today.

A general information and ticket booth is to be constructed on the plaza near the Lithia water fountains to aid visitors also. A large dual loud speaker system will be installed, relaying program schedules, assisting in traffic direction and providing other helpful information.

Funeral services will be held in the Christian church at Phoenix, Oregon, Wednesday at 2 p. m. Rev. H. Brownrigg officiating. Interment will take place in Phoenix cemetery.

CROPS IMPROVED BY SULPHATE USE SCIENTISTS TOLD

Cannery Beet Production In
Peat Soil Doubled by Tin
Application, Is Report

Pasadena, Calif., June 24.—(AP)—Tin, zinc, copper and iodine sulphates have definitely improved crop production in some regions, Dr. W. L. Powers told the American Association for the Advancement of Science, which closed its regional meeting here Saturday.

Dr. Powers, head of the soils department at Oregon State college, reported that tin sulphate had doubled cannery beet production in peat soil; zinc had increased cane fruit yields 20 to 30 per cent on silt loam soil, and copper had given good results on three widely varying types of earth.

Tin and copper never have been used commercially and Dr. Powers warned that much work remained to be done on the need and safe rates of applying these trace elements.

Boron Great Help
Manganese has improved yields of certain Willamette valley crops and boron, commonly applied in the form of borax, is being used commercially, particularly in western Oregon where it has given spectacular results.

"Boron appears to be as important for 50,000 acres of alfalfa in western Oregon as sulphur has been on eastern Oregon soils," Dr. Powers said.

The application of 40 pounds per acre of boric acid in 1937 gave a total yield increase of six tons over a three-year period and eliminated yellowtop.
