Hannah Mary Einkopf, 82, passed away at the family home, 607 Catherine street, early Wednesday morning after a prolonged illness.

Mrs. Einkopf was born in Dana, Ill., July 3, 1858. She spent her early life in Illinois, later moving to South Dakota, where she was united in marriage, coming to southern Oregon in 1908.

During her 33 years residence in Medford she made many friends who will mourn her departure. She was a member for many years of the Christian church, and also of the Women's Relief corps.

She is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Louise Uecker of Wagner, S. D., four sons, Carl and Fred Einkopf of Medford, and George Jackson of Kent, Wash., and Albert Jackson of Los Angeles, Cal., one sister, Mrs. Annie Marshall of Dana, Ill.

Funeral services will be held at the First Christian church Friday at 2 p. m., Rev. H. W. Coleman of the First Christian church officiating. Interment will take place in Phoenix cemetery.

FOUR LIVES TOLL IN ALBERTA MINE BLAST

Drumheller, Alta., June 25.—(AP)—Rescue workers today recovered from the Western Crown mine near here the bodies of three men killed by an explosion which also led to the death of a fourth man who went to their aid.

Jack Waters, 37, fire boss; Robert Taylor, 70, mine official, and Chris Buzenus, 53, were found dead in a cross-cut 800 feet inside the mine early today a few hours after Harry Crowder, 54, mine manager of the Atlas coal mine, died while attempting a rescue.

Conan Doyle, Wife Tell Need For Eradication of Nazi Power

One thing about William Randolph Hearst's ranch at McCloud, Cal. It brings a celebrity to Medford occasionally.

Latest Hearst guests to make the three-hour drive to Medford and spend a night here were Mr. and Mrs. Denis P. S. Conan Doyle, who left yesterday afternoon for San Francisco. Mr. Conan Doyle is the son of Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, the British author who during his lifetime thrilled millions of readers with his hair-raising Sherlock Holmes detective stories. The son has been lecturing in this country on "War and Christianity." His wife is the former Princess Nina of the oil-rich Mdivani family of Georgia, the little state taken over by the Bolsheviks at the time of the Russian upheaval a quarter century ago.

Having seen her family deprived of all their property by the Bolsheviks, the former princess might naturally be expected to find sardonic satisfaction in the defeat of Russia now. But she harbors no such thoughts.

"If Germany wins, perhaps she will restore property rights and my brothers and I will have our oil properties restored to us, but rather would I have the Nazis defeated," Mrs. Conan Doyle said. "If life is to be worth living, if we are to have freedom and liberty in the world, with religious tolerance and all else we hold dear and sacred, then England must win and we must all do everything we can to help her win. Nazism must be crushed and if Russia can help crush it, then we must be for Russia no matter what our own personal feelings about the Bolsheviks might be."

Mr. Conan Doyle said that he observed from his experiences in this country that Americans do not fully understand how deeply grateful the English are for the assistance the United States is rendering. England's appreciation, he asserted, has a deep, almost religious feeling.

SPRAY OR DUST IS ADVISED FOR ROT

In view of the prolonged rains it is desirable to spray or dust all peaches to prevent a loss from brown rot and peach blight, according to C. B. Cordy, assistant county agent.

"The brown rot that is showing up in the cherries will serve as a source of infection for peaches," Cordy declared. "The small amount of peach blight now showing up on peaches may also spread to serious proportions unless checked by a spray. Use six pounds of wettable sulphur per 100 gallons and spray thoroughly or dust with a 325 mesh sulphur using one-half to three-fourths pounds per tree."

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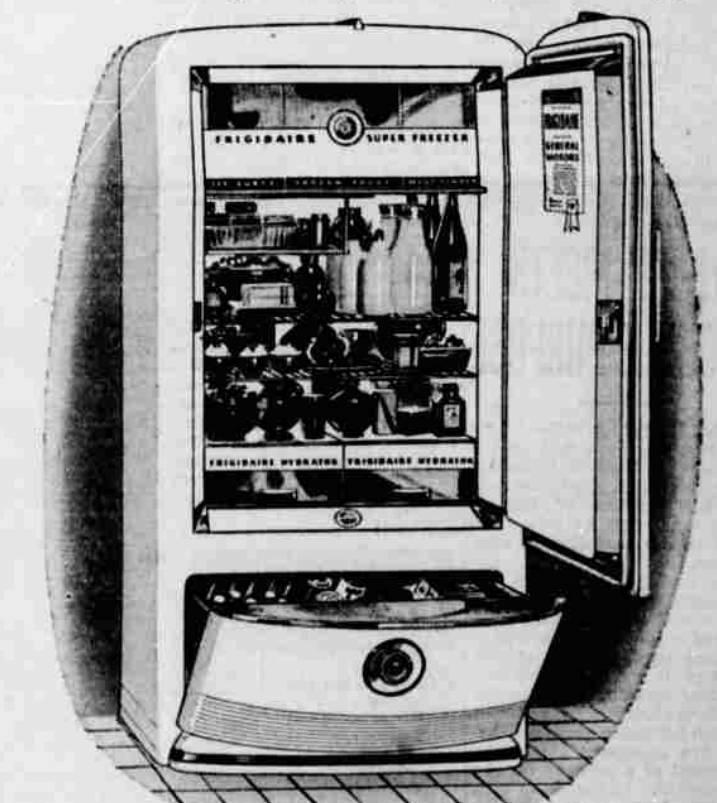
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
