Cornell Frosh Score Lone Win for East — Huskies Cop Varsity in 18:15.3

Poughkeepsie, N. Y., June 26.—(P)—It probably comes as no surprise to you to learn that, for competitive thrills, the annual intercollegiate regatta packs about as much punch these days as target practice at the Empire State building with over-ripe tomatoes as ammunition.

With rowing as a major industry of the far west, probably second only to making movies, it's getting so you know beforehand it'll be either Washington or California in a breeze. And when the Huskies of Washington rowed off and hid from the others along about dusk last evening, it was about as astonishing as finding a knife, fork and spoon at your place when you sit down to dinner.

With California bounding in with the junior varsity affair this year, the east's only consolation was Cornell's triumph in the freshman two miles. And this was accomplished probably only because the Huskies and the Bears didn't bring freshmen boatloads with them.

At the finish the Huskies were more excited about what was coming up for dinner than they were about the win. They rowed over to the sun-steaming judges' boat and only wanted to know what their time was. Just for the record, it was 18 minutes, 53.3 seconds.

Back of the two far western craft came, in order, Cornell, Syracuse, Princeton, Wisconsin, Rutgers, Massachusetts Tech, and hard luck Columbia, whose No. 2 man, Gene Remmer, suffered a cramp at about the half way mark.

ROGUES SIGN NEW MEN, INCLUDING CALVERT, HAYNES

Several new faces will be in evidence when the Medford Rogues meet the Crescent City Merchants at the high school park Sunday afternoon in the final game of the Southern Oregon league's first-half pennant race. A victory for the Rogues will clinch the title for them.

Manager Paul (Hoosier) Hoffard has signed Billy Calvert, who caught for the University of Oregon this spring; Pitcher Virgil Haynes, former Webfoot hurler now living in Klamath Falls; Darrell Leavens, infielder; George Gitten, who has caught for the Rogues for the past several seasons, and Pete Foster, a righthanded pitcher from Hill, Cal.

Missing in the Rogue lineup will be Riney Cook, regular third sacker, and Catcher Hal Adams. Cook coaches and Adams plays for the Jackson county American Legion junior team, which will play at Marshfield Sunday.

Hoffard said that Haynes would probably get the pitching call against Crescent City, with Calvert or Gitten behind the plate; Orv Hampel on first; Johnny Gitten on second; Calvert or G. Gitten on short; Leavens on third and Harold Fawcett, Mick Miller and Billy Piche in the outfield.

Attempts are being made to bring Gold Hill into the loop to take the place of Rogue River, which has disbanded, Hoffard said.

CINCY SCOUT TO MAKE PLANS FOR CAMP NEXT WEEK

Charles E. Chapman, Pacific coast scout and representative of the Cincinnati Reds' baseball system, will arrive in Medford either Sunday or Monday morning to make final arrangements for the annual tryout camp for young baseball players, which will be held at the high school park here Tuesday through Saturday of next week.

All young players, 17 to 21, are cordially invited to attend the free tryout camp, with sessions slated to start at 10 a. m. every day and end at 2 p. m., with possibly evening talks by Chapman. Players enrolling are asked only to provide their own gloves, shoes and uniforms. All other equipment will be furnished by the Cincinnati organization, one of the most far-flung in baseball.

Players showing sufficient promise will be offered contracts with one of the Cincinnati farm clubs. Regulation games will be played every day and the young players participating will receive expert coaching by professional players, who will assist Chapman in conducting the camp.

Chapman, in a letter received here today, said that among youngsters already having enrolled in the Medford camp were Johnny Gitten of Medford, Edward Courtney, pitcher-outfielder and Alvin Ross, catcher, both of Portland. The Medford camp will be the only one in Oregon.

Players wishing to attend may obtain enrollment blanks from Jack Cumming or Billy Hulén.

Ruth Hits 'Em Longer but Cobb Cops Golf Match, 3-2

Newton, Mass., June 26.—(P)—Ty Cobb may have first blood on Babe Ruth, his fellow baseball hall-of-famer, as far as their "grudge" golf matches are concerned but the latter is biding his time and he does not expect to be kept waiting over-long.

"What else can you expect when you can't sink two-foot putts," Ruth philosophized yesterday when he took a 3 and 2 drubbing from the Georgia Peach in the first of their charity exhibition series here at Commonwealth. "But watch me take him when we get to Fresh Meadow in Flushing, N. Y., on Friday. There's a course that's built for my game."

Cobb, apparently unaccustomed to playing golf before galleries as large as 2,000, appeared dazed by his triumph, which he gained by wiping out an early two-hole deficit while going on to put together a medal of 81, nine over par, against Ruth's 83.

"I never have competed under such pressure," Cobb explained. "During my 24 years in baseball, I never had to bear down as hard as I did to beat the Babe. Well, I've got something to tell my children; I finally have beaten Ruth at something."

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armored patrol cars to collections of oil reinforced drums hauled on a trailer—are becoming increasingly necessary because of the possibility of sabotage against the nation's armament race, according to the New York State Bureau of Criminal Investigation.

Cities need the new equipment, the bureau explained, to transport lethal machines to a safe place and to protect their population en route.

Noting that an experienced saboteur may use a chemical timing mechanism in a bomb, the bureau warned:

"The impression that timing mechanism exists only in the form of a clock and produces a ticking noise is a display of dangerous ignorance. Any bomb may go off at any moment."

Albany, N. Y. (P)—Near extinction five years ago, the famed Hudson river shad this year are expected to provide the largest catches in a quarter century. Fishermen predict they will haul out 4,000,000 pounds, worth \$250,000.

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
