The colorful program, with Frank DeSouza in the role of master of ceremonies, will start at 1:30 sharp. Included in the large array of entertainment features will be several numbers by Mrs. Harry Prentice's accordion band, selections by the Ashland kiltie band, an address by George M. Roberts, Medford attorney; the crowning of the queen by Judge F. L. Touvelle and the judging of the catfish at 4 o'clock sharp.

While the contestants are angling for catfish in the Rogue river, a long list of prizes donated by local merchants will be awarded to the lucky persons in the expected crowd of 4,000. The 20-30 club, sponsors of this year's derby, promise a solemn moment during the entire afternoon. Merritt Little, in charge of the program, says it has been further improved over that planned for last Sunday.

JACKSON COUNTY WELFARE CASES REACH MINIMUM

Recheck Shows 208 General Assistance Cases, 171 Unemployable, Others Ill

The Jackson county public welfare commission was told at its regular monthly meeting in city hall today that the number of general assistance cases appears to have reached an irreducible minimum.

A thorough recheck showed that of the 208 general assistance cases last month, 171 were unemployables and the remainder were medical cases, the commission was informed by Blanche D. Lyman, administrator. Curiously enough, she added, practically the same number of unemployables was shown in a similar survey made two years ago. She expressed the fear that the only hope in sight was for economic improvement in the status of relatives, so that the unemployables might thus be assisted.

Mrs. Lyman said that men were coming in and reporting that they had reached the age of 65 and thus could no longer obtain WPA work and assuming they could not procure private employment. William Perry, commission member, said that if 65-year-old men were at all able-bodied they should have no trouble finding farm work, declaring that farmers in his Eagle Point district have not been able to get enough help.

Chairman A. S. V. Carpenter asked Mr. Perry if the farmers utilized the services of the state employment office here, and Mr. Perry replied that he did not think they did to any extent. Mr. Carpenter suggested that the employment office services should be used fully by the farmers.

Mrs. Lyman reported that yesterday an application for help was received from the first person to state he had come here to work on the proposed army cantonment.

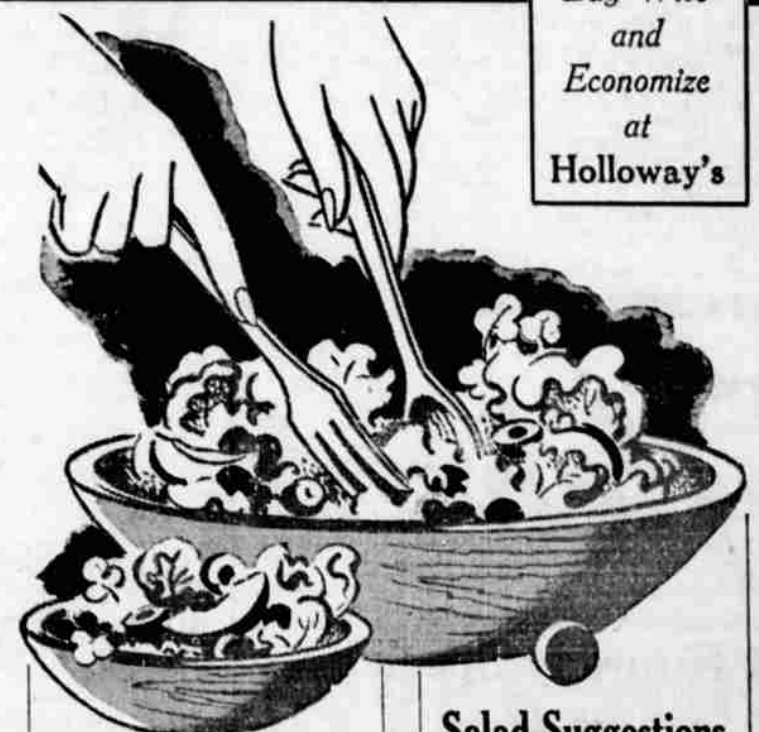
