

TRADE AND INDUSTRY SHOW FASTER TEMPO THROUGHOUT COUNTRY

New York, June 27.—(AP)—The increasing tempo of activity in trade and industry was unmistakable this week, Dun & Bradstreet said today in the review of business.

Customers crowded stores to purchase hot-weather goods, wholesalers reported demand at record proportions as fall bookings continued heavier and earlier than usual, and industry held firmly to a record rate of production, the agency enumerated.

The over-all improvement in

retail sales over a year ago reached the highest for the year to date, estimates ranging from 18 to 22 per cent. New England volume was especially heavy, ranging from 22 to 25 per cent and in the southwest the increase was 20 to 30 per cent. Estimated increases in other regions were: East 18 to 24, south and middle west 20 to 23, northwest 12 to 16 and Pacific coast 19 to 23.

In addition to heavy demand for a variety of goods of a seasonal nature, sales of automobiles and durable household goods held at record levels, the review said. Furniture and appliance sales were sharply ahead.

3 BURN TO DEATH IN L. A. APARTMENT

Los Angeles, June 27.—(AP)—Two women and a man, burned almost beyond recognition, died and three persons were injured seriously as fire raged through the Burton Arms apartment early today.

The dead tentatively were identified as a Mr. and Mrs. Goldsberg, also known as Harris, and Miss Alma Vosback. Burned so severely she could not hold on longer, the woman identified as Mrs. Goldsberg slipped from a fourth floor window ledge and fell dead as firemen arrived. The man's body was found in the Goldsberg kitchen and the third body in a fourth floor hallway.
