

RECORD CROWD TO ATTEND CATFISH DERBY ON ROGUE

Scores of hopeful anglers will gather at Bybee bridge this afternoon to compete for the fifth annual national catfishing championship, while a crowd expected to reach record proportions remains on the banks of Rogue river to enjoy a varied entertainment program under the direction of Frank DeSouza, master of ceremonies.

The entertainment will start at 1:30 sharp and continue, without a letup, until 4 o'clock, at which time the lucky and otherwise catfishers will trudge to the judges stand with their catches, if any. Contestants in the derby, sponsored by the local 20-30 club, will have the full stretch of Rogue river in which to cast their lines.

The derby show is entirely free to everybody, and 20-30 club officials cordially invite every family in the county to attend.

SEEKS IDENTITY PIGEON MARKING

Identification of bands found on the legs of a pigeon was sought through the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce yesterday by Mrs. Charles C. Manning of Trail.

There were three separate bands and they were mailed to the chamber of commerce. One was a plain circular, red celluloid band, one was rubber with the number 078 on one side and F766 on the other and one was aluminum with the legend Au 40-OHC-7521. Mrs. Manning wrote that she would be interested in learning the history of the pigeon, the name of its owners and how far it had flown.

The pigeon, a dark blue homing bird, was found by Mr. Manning Wednesday afternoon on the Bruce Grieve ranch near Prospect. The bird bore no signs of injury but indications were that it had been poisoned. Mrs. Manning wrote. She said she did all she could for it but despite her efforts the pigeon died in a few hours.

500 2ND LIEUTENANTS ARE NEEDED BY ARMY SIGNAL CORPS RESERVE

Word was received today by Lt. Col. B. H. Hensley, district recruiting officer U. S. army for Oregon from the war department that vacancies exist for immediate appointment of approximately 500 second lieutenants in the signal corps reserve.

Applicants must have a college degree, or its practical equivalent, in electrical engineering and have specialized in radio communication, or be electronic physicists. Applicants may be enlisted men in any component of the army, civilians, or commissioned personnel either active or inactive status. He must be unmarried, without dependents and between the ages of 21 and 36, and able to meet physical standards prescribed.

Colonel Hensley states those qualified should make application by informal letter direct to the chief signal officer, Washington, D. C., giving name, address, age, military status, if any, and an outline of technical qualifications and experience.
