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CONGRESS BALKS AT HINT TO MAKE EMERGENCY CALL

Move Would Extend Army Service and Lift Ban on Troops Abroad.

Washington, June 28.—(AP)—Word circulated at the capitol today that the war department wanted a congressional declaration of a national emergency and brought out immediate manifestations of opposition.
Such a declaration would permit national guardsmen and selective service trainees to be kept in active service indefinitely, and would also lift the present restriction on the president's powers to send troops out of the western hemisphere.

Representative Woodrum (D-Va.) expressed his views in the house by declaring that such a proposal would bring a "little storm of protest by one member of congress who has gone 100 percent with the administration's foreign policy."
And Representative Starnes (D-Ala.) said congress and the people were ready to spend any amount and exert whatever effort was required to safeguard the western hemisphere, but that there was no plan or intention of this country's going to war.

In executive departments, meantime, the defense program itself was pushed ahead and there were new moves to ease its impact on civilians.

GOEBBELS FACES HARD JOB SAVING FUEHRER'S FACE

The great task Hitler assigned to Nazi armies launched against Russia a week ago pales into insignificance beside that he simultaneously entrusted to Dr. Goebbels and his Nazi propaganda specialists.

Goebbels' experts were commanded to set about proving overnight to a stunned world that the two-year appearance of the Nazi lion and the communist lamb lying down together was mere camouflage. The lamb, the world is now told, was the real objective of the lion all the time.

That the Russian lamb happened to be a tempting morsel, rich in such vital war juices as oil and grain, is a mere happenstance in the Hitler-Von Ribbentrop-Goebbels white-book. It develops as they state the case that it wasn't a lamb at all with which they had so trustfully consorted, but a wolf in sheep's clothing, sharpening its fangs to eat up the lion in due course.

Seven days of furious red-nazi fighting on a front nearly 1,500 miles long have failed to disclose conclusively just what kind of a fighting animal Soviet Russia is. The bear is the favorite symbol for Russia and all ways has been. It looks from this distance as though Hitler might yet find it was a bear and neither a lamb nor a wolf he had by the tail.

This much certainly is true: Hitler is urgently seeking help now as never before from small continental neighbors as well as big. His personal appeal to Finland to join-up was, no doubt, backed up with glowing promises of Finland restored and expanded at Russia's expense once Russia was crushed. Berlin could have saved Finland with a nod to Moscow in 1939-40.

Nazi agents picture Hitler in all Scandinavia as the white knight now turning his bloody spear against the red dragon. All else that he has done is to be forgotten and forgiven.

PARDON ASKED BY SLAYER ORCHARD

Boise, Idaho, June 28.—(AP)—Examination today of the Idaho pardon board calendar for July revealed many of the state penitentiary's long-term prisoners, including several convicted of murder, will seek clemency when the board begins its meetings Tuesday.

Fourteen convicted murderers are on the list of 145 pardon applications, headed by that of Harry Orchard, 74-year-old convicted assassin of former Gov. Frank Steunenberg. Orchard is the oldest prisoner in term of incarceration. He is now serving his 33rd year.

Convicted murderers asking clemency include Mide Donnelly, who has served 17 years on a Bonner county conviction; Darrell Thurston, who has served 16 years for a Nez Perce county slaying; Jack Reding of Kootenai county, who has served 10 years, and Rustaf Abrahamson of Benewah.

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
