

MINING HAS BEST BIG PROFIT HOPE, MITCHELL STATES

No other industry offers greater opportunities for huge, quick profits than mining, either for the prospector, the grub-staker, or the development company.

In no other field can a man or a group of men find wealth more quickly than in the discovery and development of a good gold vein. In these days when profits on other investments are being closely watched and supervised and when the stock market is minutely regulated, one would naturally think that men would seek quick wealth in some other field. Gold mining offers the opportunities that the stock market did a few years ago.

Many Profits Seen
A gold mine, when really productive, produces profits from many directions. Profits flow from the mine itself, from speculation on its shares and from a general rise in business in a community. The increase in share value is, perhaps, the most important to the speculator. The income from production is the most important to the prospector and the investor. Better business conditions are the result for the business man. In practically no other field of endeavor can a man work on a shoestring with the same hope for reward.

Many small fortunes have been taken from the mountain sides of southern Oregon by men who had no other investment than a pick, a shovel and a wheelbarrow. Almost any gold-bearing vein, with certain indications on the surface, will yield enough free gold, if prospected intelligently, to put the mine into operation. I was amazed to find that practically nobody is developing ore bodies here. Upon studying conditions, I came to the conclusion that something is needed to stir up interest. About all I could do was to write and talk. In making application to southern Oregon, I have used the very best authorities available. I find no excuse for the general lack of interest.

Cites Fabulous Returns
As a rule a sale of shares provides the funds to equip and work a mine. Share values in the prospect stage are generally low—\$1 or less. A strike of rich ore causes values to rise, sometimes many hundredfold, and a small speculation may be worth a lifetime of hard labor. Almost any business man could, if he wished, invest a few dollars in a new undertaking which holds such immense possibilities. Business men gamble on other things which have much less chance of success, but an investment for the business man, if wisely made, will come back a thousand fold in one or another manner as the result of the stimulation of business in the community.

I was reared in the greatest and largest hard-rock mining district of its kind in the world. I have known men, many men, investing in worthless mines getting rich in business. Naturally no one would advocate making poor investments but nowhere have I seen great gains among business men because of a dry hole.

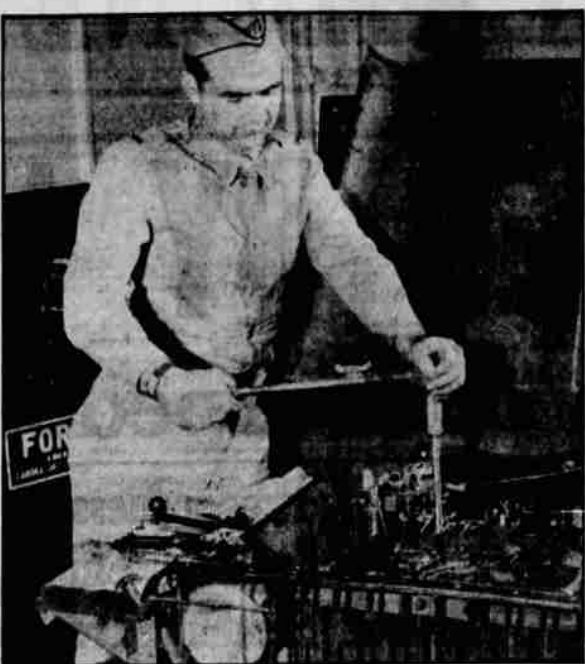

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KITCHEN SHELF SOON TO HAVE FEWER SPICES

Washington (U.P.)—The nation's housewives, already asked to give up aluminum pots and pans in the interests of national defense, are faced with a new "kitchen shortage"—a shortage of tea, spices and other imported commodities.

Curtailment of shipping facilities plying between Mediterranean, African, Far Eastern ports and the United States has cut off entirely or depleted supplies of tea, nutmeg, cloves, tapioca, palm and vegetable oils, caraway, celery, mustard and poppy seeds, sage, cream of tartar, olive oil, dates, Arabian coffee for special blends, paprika and extracts used in vanilla and other liquid flavoring.

Moreover, supplies of tung oil used in paint; bamboo used in fishing and ski poles; lightweight furniture; opium, digitalis, belladonna used for medicinal purposes; licorice used in

candy and as a coating for pills, and many other imported products are dwindling.

Defense officials said that boats which formerly carried these products from other countries are being loaded "to the brim" with tungsten, rubber, tin, mica and other vitally-needed armament materials. Mediterranean and Red sea ports, which normally load huge supplies of seeds, olive oil, medicinal and other products, "have been cut off 100 per cent" from our use by the war, one official said.

Roundup, Mont. (U.P.)—Water pumped from a coal mine may be used to irrigate farm lands. The Musselshell county board of commissioners has submitted a project to the Works Projects Administration for approval under which a dam and reservoir would be constructed.

MUCH HAY HURT BY HEAVY RAINS

County Agent Robert G. Fowler said today a high percentage of the hay held in the fields by the showers of the past ten days was damaged, and had little value as feed, he believed. Work of hauling the hay, after two days of sunshine, started on many farms. Cutting of the second crop is expected early next month.

Harvesting of wheat and other grains is expected to start generally next week. Some is already underway.

The cherry crop has been harvested, and the small berry harvest is now under way. First picking and packing of the Bartlett pear crop is expected around July 23 with the harvest in full blast a week later. No cannery prices have yet been brought forth. Some packers and growers predict a \$35 to \$40 a ton cannery price, due to the defense prosperity, demand for canned fruits, and a smaller crop than last year in the Santa Clara valley. No definite figures are expected before the middle of July.

BRITON HURT IN CHUNGKING RAID

Chungking, June 30.—(U.P.)—Sir Arthur Blackburn, counselor for the British embassy, was injured during a four-hour, two-wave attack on this provisional Chinese capital yesterday by 63 Japanese bombers.

The British counselor's jaw was injured and he was pulled from the debris of the embassy dugout and taken to a hospital. Three other Britons were injured.

Property of the American Methodist mission, already scarred from four previous raids, was damaged further. One bomb smashed into the mission hospital, wrecking equipment and supplies of medicine.
