Oscar (Red) Miller, who never has been beaten by Medford, continued to be a jinx for the locals yesterday by beating Dutch Leiber in a mound duel to give the Albany Oaks a 3 to 2 win over the Craters as the Oregon State league started its second-half pennant race. The game was played at Albany.

Miller allowed only four hits, one of them Manager Lou Sauer's homer in the sixth inning with the bases empty, while Leiber yielded seven.

The Craters had an excellent chance to tie the game in the ninth when Sauer, who got two of Medford's four hits, singled and was sacrificed to second by Joe Gray. Al Lightner, brother of Allan (Wray) Lightner, and who was just released by the Salem Senators of the Western International league, struck out, and Harold Martenson grounded out to end the game.

Manager Sauer said today that Lightner, an outfielder, had signed with the Craters and would probably be here for an exhibition game against Yreka Wednesday night. Jack Brown or Bill Smith will hurl for the locals, while Steve Crippen is expected to pitch for the Californians.

The Silverton Red Sox, combining two Hills Creek southpaws, Don Pendergrass and Bun Kelsay, for 14 hits, won easily, 8 to 3, at Swimmers' Delight near Eugene.

Bob Wiltshire pitched shutout ball at Toledo to give Eugene a 10 to 0 victory.

Klamath Falls won a pair of games at home, defeating the Bend Elks 5 to 4 in an exhibition tilt Saturday night and 6 to 4 in a league fray yesterday.

MORE CHANGES IN
CCC COMPANIES
SLATED JULY 7

Headquarters here today announced receipt of official notice of the disbandment of three additional Medford district companies and the shifting of three others. The effective date was July 7 in all but one instance.

The latest move brings to nine the total of Medford district companies ordered disbanded. Remaining will be 22 of the 31 camps in existence July 1.

Under the latest order the following companies will be disbanded July 7: 920, Camp Orleans, Cal.; 2904, South Umpqua Falls, and 3442, Camp Hart Mountain.

Company 5478 will move from Camp Gasquet, Cal., to Camp South Umpqua Falls. It had been announced recently that a change was in store for Gasquet but the nature of it was not definitely known.

Company 6412 will move from

Camp Leaf, Cal., to Camp Orleans. Company 6451 will move from Camp Selad, Cal., to Camp Beaver Creek as soon as the new camp is ready for occupancy. Camp Beaver Creek is being erected in northern California for blister rust control work.
