FARM BILL NEAR FINAL APPROVAL

Washington, June 30.—(P)—The senate brought the \$1,060,500,000 farm bill to the verge of final congressional action today, but it had to go back to the house for expected approval of minor amendments.

Final action also was expected on the \$936,390,000 relief bill, and leaders said there was no doubt that congress could finish up all last minute appropriations well in advance of midnight, when this fiscal year ends.

Washington, June 30.—(P)—Driving to clean up last-minute appropriations before the fiscal year ends at midnight, the senate finally approved and sent to the White House today the \$1,060,500,000 supply bill for the labor department and the federal security agency.

MEDFORD YOUTHS WIN LAURELS IN PRACTICE STATE

Nine Hold High Offices in Legion Beaver Boys' Camp, Word On Return

Twenty-six happy local youths, nine of whom won high state and city offices at the fifth annual American Legion Beaver Boys' state camp in Corvallis, June 22 to 29, inclusive, returned to their homes in a special bus last night, and with the unanimous declaration those eight days were just about the most enjoyable they had ever spent.

Attending the camp, which is a regular American Legion activity, were 264 boys representing almost every community in Oregon. The camps are staged for the purpose of giving young boys actual experience in organization, citizenship, self-government, politics and democracy.

Four State Officers
Four state officers were won by Medford boys. Bob Holmes was elected state treasurer and Ned Liebman, Camden Wheaton and Earl Higgins were elected justices of the state supreme court. Liebman was then named as chief justice.

Elected as mayors of the 12 mythical cities in the Beaver Boys' state were Bob Holmes, of Santiam; Bill Wall, of Hood River; Bob Davis, of Siskiyou; and Elmer Bashaw, of Modoc. Cato Wray, who was voted the best sportsman in the camp and elected vice-president of the camp alumni association, missed by one vote in his race for governor. He was the Federalist party candidate, and was defeated by Tom Spindle of Portland. Niel Allen, Jr. of Grants Pass was the Nationalist party nominee. It was first announced that Cato had won the governorship, but a recount showed Spindle victor in the election by a count of 103 to 102.

Ashland Boy Wins \$25
The camp's highest honor was awarded to Bill Blackmer of Ashland, who was secretary of state and mayor of Jefferson. He received the Jackson award of \$25 in cash for being the mayor of the city making the best all-around showing.

The boys all were quartered in the five halls of the men's dormitory on the Oregon State college campus.

Ernest W. Winkle, commander of the Medford Post of the American Legion, today praised the excellent work done by Robert R. Ebel, chairman of the Beaver Boys' State committee of the local post, and a state Legion director of the Beaver Boys' State commission. He accompanied the boys to the camp.

"For the past three years we have been able to send an increasing number of local boys to the camp, all because of the untiring effort of Comrade Ebel," Commander Winkle said. "His interest in the program and the encouragement he gives the boys is largely responsible. I believe, for the ranking elective and appointive offices they receive at the camp every year."

Ebel's job, explained Winkle, was to contact the various organizations and individuals who desire to sponsor the boys at the camp, the cost of which is approximately \$17.50 per boy. To sponsors who have no particular boy in mind they would like to send to the camp, Ebel makes suggestions of boys deserving of the trip. Ebel is Chief de Gare of the 40 et 8, Legion fun organization.

BARRYMORE EJECTED FROM CARROLL CAFE AFTER SOCK ON JAW

Hollywood, June 30.—(P)—The Earl Carroll cafe management said actor John Barrymore was ejected early today after a patron swung at him.

Five table captains escorted John Barrymore to the door after a man who said he was Clarence Reed of Bakersfield, Cal., objected to remarks the actor made in the presence of Reed's unidentified woman companion.

Accounts of the incident varied. Some said Reed landed one on John's chin whiskers and that he went down in a heap. Others said Reed swung, missed Barrymore's chin, but that John, in dodging, lost his footing and fell.

Everybody agreed that Barrymore was hustled to the sidewalk.

BLAME FIREWORKS FOR GRASS FIRE

Fireworks may not be sold, discharged or otherwise used inside the city limits, Fire Chief Roy Elliott reminded the public today after a firecracker-caused blaze had scorched a fence along the alley in back of the junior high school.

No explosive article or material of any kind ordinarily identified with Fourth of July celebrations may be used in the city, Chief Elliott emphasized in pointing to the fire hazards involved.

The blaze that Chief Elliott attributed to firecrackers occurred Saturday evening. The grass along the alley was ignited and the fence scorched. The fire department's chemical crew put the fire out.

WPA Closing Urged in Douglas County

Roseburg, Ore., June 30.—(P)—A resolution urging the temporary closing of the WPA and the striking from the list of any relief client refusing to accept offered employment, was submitted here today by the directors of the Douglas County Taxpayers league.

The resolution directed to the works progress administration declares that there is a serious shortage of farm labor in Douglas county and that assistance must be obtained by farmers if crops are to be saved.

Harpooned Whale Damages Vessel

Victoria, June 30.—(CP)—Damaged in a spectacular fight with a harpooned whale off the northern tip of the Queen Charlotte Islands, the steam whaler Brown reached here overnight from Naden Harbor, B. C.

A big sperm, enraged after being harpooned, charged the Brown, thrashing the sea into a white foam as it dived and careened under the vessel, denting its steel plates in the encounter.

Portland Chinese Boy Wins Award

Portland, June 30.—(P)—A \$1,000 first award by the art division of the American Magazine went to Fred Gong, 18, Portland Chinese student at Lincoln high school.

The edition of the magazine appearing here today said the local boy's contribution, a charcoal drawing with thin layers of oil, was first in a contest that attracted 655,898 contestants. The subject was "What My Community Contributes to the Nation."

WHEELER THINKS NAVY IN SHOOTING WAR NOW; URGES INVESTIGATION

Washington, June 30.—(P)—Senator Wheeler (D-Mont.) proposed today that the senate investigate whether the American navy has "begun shooting" in carrying out its patrol activities.

Saying that Secretary Knox had declined to affirm or deny rumors that an American warcraft had sunk a German submarine, Wheeler added in a statement that "it is the duty of congress to determine the facts."

Wheeler offered a resolution suggesting that the investigation be conducted by the senate naval committee.

"If we have begun shooting, if we are in an undeclared war," Wheeler's statement said, "the constitution of the United States, which provides that only congress can declare war, has been violated. The persons who authorized or ordered any such shooting should be identified, and for any violation of the law of the land—they should be made to suffer the consequences."

POPE SEES WAR PENALTY FOR SIN

Vatican City, June 30.—(P)—In a Sunday message broadcast to the world, Pope Pius XII attributed the sufferings of war to divine providence punishing the sins of mankind, but said the "fierce intensity of the trial" would be followed by a new era of peace and hope.

The holy father made no specific mention of the Russian-German conflict, but spoke of the sufferings from war at the fighting front and behind the lines—from bombs, machine-gun bullets, blockade and counter-blockade, and from persecutions endured because of religious faith.

Cairo, Egypt, June 30.—(P)—General Bertello, who until recently commanded Italian forces holding British Somaliland, has surrendered to the British, the middle east command announced today.
