ORDER NEW TRIAL IN LIBEL AWARD

Salem, July 1.—(P)—The state supreme court ordered a new trial today in the libel suit of Ralph DeLashmitt, Portland florist, against the Journal Publishing company. DeLashmitt was awarded \$5,050 damages in the court of Circuit Judge Robert Tucker of Multnomah county.

DeLashmitt caused the arrest of a peeping Tom, but in the article about it on December 3, 1938, the Oregon Journal erroneously identified DeLashmitt as the peeper.

Other decisions today: Independent Packing Co. vs. E. C. Corn, appellant. Appeal from Jackson county. Suit for \$889 as alleged agreed price for pears. Opinion by Justice Lusk. Judge H. D. Norton, affirmed.

Novel Silo

Hollis, Okla. (U.P.)—James P. Lamberth, who lives 10 miles northeast of Hollis, has constructed a silo made of slats held upright by wire and lined with treated paper. The novel structure cost only \$21. There will be additional cost of \$5 a year for paper lining. It has a capacity of 25 tons.

RUSSIA IN MOVE FOR U.S. SUPPLIES

Washington, July 1.—(P)—Sumner Welles, acting secretary of state, disclosed today that Russia had made its first overtures toward getting supplies from the United States.

Welles said Constantine Oumansky, Soviet ambassador, had conferred yesterday with him on the placing of orders for materials for Soviet Russia to defend against German invasion.

The Russian request, Welles added, had been forwarded to the other governmental departments interested.

Welles declined to give any details concerning the material wanted, explaining that would not be possible since Soviet Russia was a belligerent.

(U.P.)—The agricultural college of the University of California has undertaken to establish whether a rubber producing industry from the guayule plant is a practical possibility in California. A nursery has been set aside for the growing of seedlings of the plant and these will be distributed throughout the state.

O'DANIEL LEADS IN TEXAS VOTE

Dallas, Texas, July 1.—(P)—Gov. W. Lee O'Daniel, who wooed the voters with hillbilly music, forged into a lead of 379 in the race for United States senator from Texas today with an estimated 200 to 300 ballots still to be counted.

He had snatched the lead away from new deal Congress-

man Lyndon Johnson this morning.

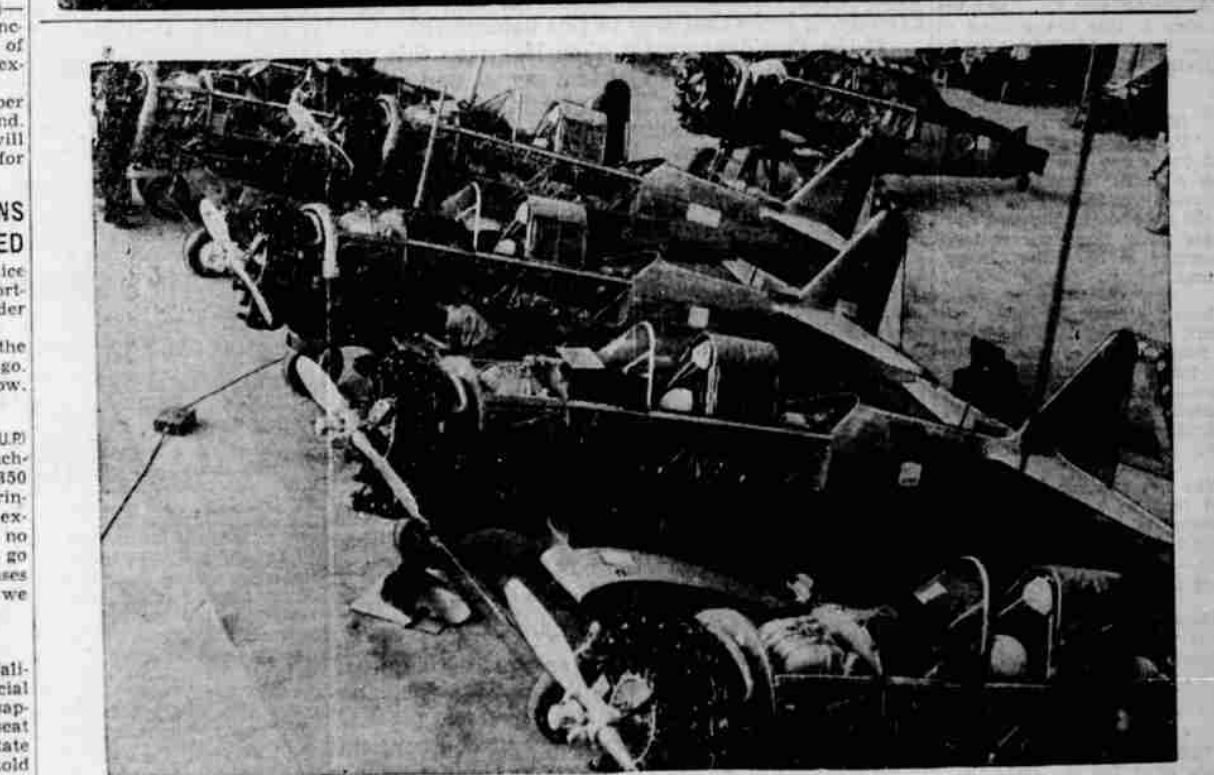
