

TAX BILL DRAFT INCREASES LEVY ON CORPORATIONS

Washington, July 2.—(AP)—The house ways and means committee completed the preliminary drafting of a \$3,504,400,000 tax bill today—\$4,400,000 above its goal—after voting tentatively to increase the capital stock tax on corporations.

Representative Cooper (D-Tenn.), a member, announced that the committee had agreed tentatively to raise the capital stock tax from the present rate of \$1.10 per \$1,000 to \$1.25. He said this was estimated to yield \$18,000,000.

The committee also voted to impose a 10 per cent manufacturers' excise tax on cutlery which would produce an estimated \$6,000,000 and to increase the present withholding tax on non-resident aliens and non-resident foreign corporations from 15½ per cent to 27½ per cent.

Cooper announced that the committee had also voted tentatively to revise its proposed tax on slot machines so as to exempt bona fide merchandise vending machines and to restrict the tax—\$25 annually for the use of such machines—to pinball and other gambling devices.

31 MILDLY POISONED BY CUSTARD PASTRY

Portland, July 2.—(AP)—Thirty-one persons were recovering today from mild cases of food poisoning which Dr. Adolph Weinzierl, city health officer, blamed on custard-filled cakes.

The cakes have been withdrawn from stores, and the manufacturing firm has promised to quit making them, he said.

Hospitals treated several of the victims, none seriously ill.

ACCUSED INDIAN IN BASTILE HERE

Charged with the first degree murder of his brother, Nathaniel, 30, Boyd Jackson, Jr., 22, a Klamath Indian of Sprague River, was held in Jackson county jail today pending his removal to Portland or other action in the case.

Jackson was brought to the jail here last night by Paul Hanlin, U. S. deputy marshal, from Klamath Falls where he had waived a preliminary hearing before U. S. Commissioner Bert C. Thomas and was held for the grand jury without bail.

A few hours after he returned

home from Reno with his bride of one day, Boyd, Jr., shot and killed his brother about 3 a. m. Monday, the government charged. The father, who had recently returned from his post as tribal delegate at Washington, D. C., and another of his sons, had to beat Boyd, Jr., with the butt of the gun to subdue him, the alleged slayer suffering a broken jaw and several fractured ribs in the fracas, authorities said. Only a little of the prisoner's face showed today, his head being encased in a cast.

Turkish Ship Sinks

London, July 2.—(AP)—Reuters, British news agency, reported today from Istanbul that the 3,490-ton Turkish freighter Vatan sank in the Black sea after striking a floating mine. The crew was reported saved.

BLIGHT BURNING FIRE SMUDGE OIL

A 50-gallon drum of smudge oil and a pile of tree props were set on fire this forenoon by a stack of blight limbs being burned on the H. A. DuBuque orchard on the Central Point-Crater Lake highway side road near the L.O.O.F. cemetery.

The flaming oil was smothered out and the burning props and limbs were put out without other damage, the state forest patrol office reported. The patrol headquarters sent a pumper and crew to the fire.

JUSTICE DOUGLAS IN WEST TO FISH

Portland, Ore., July 2.—(AP)—Fishing was the chief interest of Associate Justice William O. Douglas of the U. S. supreme court, who arrived here last night for his annual Pacific northwest vacation.

He said he would remain through the summer, headquarters at La Grande, Ore., where his wife and their two children are visiting Mrs. Douglas' mother.

Fishing trips into both Oregon and Washington are planned, however, and later he will attend the Oregon state bar meeting and the Astoria regatta.
