

REGISTRATION FOR PACKING SCHOOL TO CLOSE ON JULY 7

First Session Opens July 14; Enrollment May Be Made at Any Packing House

Registration for the first session of the 1941 pear-packing school will end July 7, those in charge announced today. It was urged that all who are interested make application for enrollment at any of the packing houses, all of which are cooperating with the Medford public school system and the state department of vocational education.

First session will open on July 14 and those trained at this session will begin packing when the fruit comes in. The session will be held at Pinnacle plant No. 2 with L. M. Bodin as superintendent and Mrs. Patricia Riley as office manager. Classes will be from 1 to 5 p.m. and 6 to 10 p.m.

Will Be Notified
Students who have already filed applications will be notified when and where to register. All persons under 18 who register must provide a birth certificate as designated by the state labor commission in order to obtain a work permit, the school management announced. Certificates will be granted each student satisfactorily completing the course.

It was announced today that there were a few vacancies in the first session. Anyone planning to register for the second session, slated for about August 1, was advised to register now. Vacancies in the first session will be filled from time to time from the list for the second session, the management said.

Waters, North Bend, re-enlisted for the 7th Infantry, Fort Lewis, Wash. Sgt. Cushman stated that "Keep 'Em Flying" requisition No. 1 has been received from the war department and is placed on the recruiting district for procurement during July as follows: Air corps, Jefferson Barracks, Ellington field, Texas, Moffett, and Stockton fields, Calif.; infantry, field artillery, coast artillery corps, quarter-master corps and medical department in Hawaii and the Philippine Islands. Any youth physically fit who can make 100 or more on the army general classification test is qualified for any of the vacancies, Sgt. Cushman said.

RED CROSS SWIM SCHOOL TO OPEN AT NAT JULY 7

Charles Eaton to Instruct Enrollees of All Ages and Sexes — No Tuition

Under the instruction of Charles L. Eaton, who will have a staff of able assistants, the annual Red Cross free swimming and water safety classes will open at the Medford natatorium next Monday morning, July 7 and continue daily through July 19. Although there will be a small fee for use of the pool, enrollment in the popular school will be free and students are asked only to provide their own swimming suits and towels.

The classes are open to all children and adults in Medford and vicinity. Enrollment may be made at the natatorium or at the Red Cross headquarters in the county courthouse. The school will end with a gala water show the night of July 19. Classes will be held for seven different classifications of swimmers, both boys and girls. They are: beginners, intermediates, swimmers, advanced swimmers, junior life-saving, adult classes and senior life-saving.

Assisting Eaton will be Marjorie Kelly, chairman of Red Cross lifesaving for Jackson county; Mrs. Dorothy Perl and Miss Frances Arnsperger, recent graduate of the Red Cross aquatic school at Issaquah, Wash. Other local lifesavers desiring to assist are asked to get in touch with Miss Kelly or the Red Cross headquarters.

Beginners' classes will be held in the morning, and parents are asked not to send their children to the nat too early. Following is the daily schedule of classes:

TOWNSEND CONCLAVE TOLD PENSION PLAN NEEDED IN DEFENSE

Buffalo, N. Y., July 3.—(AP)—Rep. Martin F. Smith (D., Wn.) told the sixth national Townsend convention today this nation's defense must be bolstered "by increasing the 'stake' which our people have in the preservation of democracy."

Maintaining that "a short sighted policy of indifference to social welfare" contributed to "the downfall of France," Smith said in a prepared address, "We are not going to repeat the mistakes and defeatism of France, we are going to insure victory by practicing the virtues of the true American democracy."

That means, he declared, "the Townsend plan, of cost of production for our farmers, a square deal for labor and unemployment relief," which he continued, "are just as essential to our national defense, if not more so, than planes, battleships, tanks, guns and munitions."

Smith explained, "under our present Townsend bill" about \$50 a month would be paid to citizens 60 years old or over "based upon our present gross national income" but that the pensions would rise with increasing prosperity."

Salem, July 3.—(AP)—Contract for grading 4.7 miles of the Grave Creek-Jumpoff Joe Creek section of the Pacific highway in Josephine county was awarded by the state highway commission today to Frank Penpacker of Portland, on low bid of \$133,317.

FIRECRACKER BURNS OF DANGEROUS TYPE

Portland, July 3.—(AP)—A warning against letting small children get near firecrackers was voiced today by Dr. Joseph B. Bilderback, head of the pediatric department of the University of Oregon medical school. He said that firecracker burns are the most dangerous type for tetanus and that anti-tetanus toxin is essential to prevent lock jaw.

FOREST AREAS ARE READY FOR FOURTH UNDER CLEAR SKY

Conditions Reported Generally Excellent Unless Rain Spoils Week-Ends

The following recreational bulletin was issued this morning by headquarters of Rogue River national forest, department of agriculture:

"Unless more rain occurs, forest conditions are generally excellent for the holiday week-end, with roads and camps in better shape than usual at this time of year because they are not so dusty."

"All streams are now quite clear and fishing is greatly improved. In the Rogue river near Trail, salmon and trout are rising to cluster eggs. In the streams above Union Creek bucktail, McGinty and natural salmon flies and also eggs are bringing good catches. In the south fork of the Rogue and in the Blue Canyon lakes the limit is being taken by many anglers. Early visitors to the Seven Lakes basin also report good luck."

"The Applegate river and its tributaries offer better opportunities than earlier in the season. One tributary suggested is Steves fork where a hike of five miles offers good fishing and also the enjoyment of magnificent beds of wild rhododendrons and azaleas. At Fish lake several limit catches of eastern brook have been recently reported, the technique being still fishing with worms and egg clusters."

Road Impassable

"At Four Mile lake rainbow are being taken by trolling with troutminnows. Only a few catches are being made at Lake o' Woods."

"In the Union Creek district the Woodruff Meadows road is impassable because of damage done by logging trucks. In the Butte Falls district the Butte Falls-Prospect road and the Parker Meadows road have deep mudholes making travel inadvisable. The Ashland loop road is still closed by snow near Mt. Ashland and, on the Applegate side, one mile beyond Jackson gap. It is also still impossible to reach Cinnabar Springs from this route. All other roads in the forest are ready for travel."

Many Flowers

"Wildflowers are now blooming profusely at the higher altitudes and, because of the late rains, still remain at the lower levels also. On Herschberger mountain the greatest variety is found, including scarlet julia, columbine, low larkspur, baneberry, bluebell, scarlet penstemon and mountain ash. Birds are also seen in greater numbers than usual, particularly coveys of quail and grouse."
