Ring and Wedding Trips Are Wasteful, Economist Says

South Bend, Ind.—(U.P.)—That limp-looking necktie in the middle of July is not only "senseless," says John H. Sheehan, economics expert at Notre Dame university, but an "economic waste."

Outmoded customs and habits hurt America both socially and economically, this educator argues.

Take the American habit of buying, he said. "If you want your full money's worth consult the home economics bulletins of your state universities and the United States labor and agricultural pamphlets," he advised.

The custom of observing holidays in the middle of the week is another social and economic wrong, according to Sheehan, who advocates attaching all holidays to the close of the week-end.

"Not only does industry lose approximately half a billion dollars yearly in the one-day shutdowns, but millions of people lose socially in the work interruptions," Sheehan said.

He blamed human inertia, ignorance and a general lack of courage for the failure of Americans to throw off the outmoded customs.

Even love goes on, dewy-eyed and saddled with "useless and outlandish" habits, Sheehan asserted.
