STATE LIBRARIAN DIES OF CANCER

Salem, July 5.—(P)—State Librarian Harriet Catherine Long, 53, died yesterday of cancer.

Head of the Oregon library system since 1930, she had been in library work for the past 31 years.
A native of Madison, Neb., she was graduated from the University of Nebraska in 1908, the New York state library school in 1910 and earned a master's degree in 1925. In 1935, Willamette university conferred an honorary doctor of literature degree.

She engaged in library work with the army on the Mexican border, in France and Germany in 1918 and 1919. In 1920 she headed the Wisconsin traveling library department.

Funeral services, to be followed by cremation, will be held at the Clough-Barrick chapel here at 10 a. m. Monday.

SWIM TEACHERS CLASS TO OPEN

DEFENSE SPENDING BILLION MONTHLY COME SEPTEMBER

Accelerated Outgo Expected To Make Good On Estimate \$15 Billion For Year

Washington, July 5.—(P)—Harold D. Smith, budget director, predicted today that expanding defense expenditures would reach a rate of \$1,000,000,000 a month by September. This acceleration, he said, should make good recent estimates that defense costs this fiscal year will be \$15,500,000,000. Reviewing the last fiscal year (which ended June 30), Smith said \$6,274,000,000 was spent for defense. The spending rate was \$807,000,000 in June.

"I have just spent three and a half weeks visiting defense plants," the budget head said, "and I got the definite impression that we are going to have a pretty sharp step-up in production pretty soon."

Many Agencies
Although noting that the defense total of the past year was \$190,000,000 short of the budget estimate made last January, Smith said it failed to reflect other millions of dollars of defense work being done by nominally "non-defense" agencies.

Saying it was too early to predict the effect of the pending tax bill, Smith said that, at present, his predictions for the current fiscal year based on existing taxes and appropriations were the same as in a June 1 statement which forecast \$22,269,000,000 total expenditures and \$9,402,000,000 revenues.

Portland, July 5.—(P)—The Oregon Republican central committee will meet here Monday to select a successor to State Chairman Kern Crandall, who resigned for army duty.

Crandall recommended Niel Allen, Grants Pass, for the post, but opposition has appeared. Among others mentioned is Frederick Lampert, Salem.

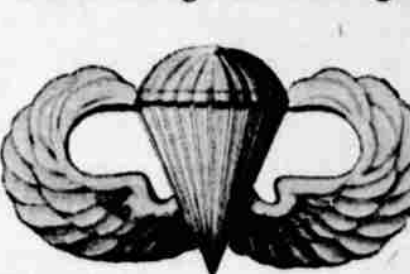

Japanese Decision Cold Stored Until Axis-Russian Battle Tide More Definite, Simpson Declares

Word that Japan is considering an extension of her territorial waters which would cut off the Russian port of Vladivostok from American war supplies may be taken as an indication that the Tokyo government is leaning toward active steps to aid Germany.

It seems a fair deduction, however, that the essence of Japan's great but undisclosed policy decision with regard to the Nazi-Soviet war can be stated in three words, "Wait and see."

For the moment, at least, her policy is to avoid flaunting directly in the faces of her axis mates in Berlin and Rome a flat refusal to implement her tripartite pact with action against Russia. It was that which led Tokyo statesmen to the novel procedure of reaching a grave decision—and then putting it into cold-storage, undisclosed.

Knows Red Resources
Presumably Japan intends to do nothing of major importance for the present. One reason may be that Tokyo knows much more about Soviet resources and resourcefulness than does Berlin. Japan has been dealing with Moscow for a long time and is quite well aware that even if Germany wrests control of White Russia, the Ukraine and the Leningrad region, Russia still will have sufficient manpower and war industry resources east of the Urals to make her a ponderous factor in the far east.

Nor can Tokyo doubt that the axis-Soviet war will increase Japanese difficulties in China. It surely has removed the last possibility of serious friction between Chinese nationalists and the powerful Chinese Communist elements.

There was a time when Tokyo agents sought hopefully to promote that discord. Their dream of internal disintegration in China is now shattered completely.

There are reasons to doubt that Japan will move to restrict the usefulness of Vladivostok unless she is ready to fight Russia's far eastern forces.

A Nazi-Finn attempt all day is under way to squeeze Russia out of her only all-year sea outlet into the Atlantic at Murmansk. In addition, axis forces are threatening her approaches

to the Mediterranean via the Black sea. If red forces are driven out of both the Murmansk area and the Ukraine, whatever remains of Russia in Soviet hands will have only far eastern sea outlets to the world.

Would Invite Offensive

With Vladivostok in effect blockaded, Japan's costly puppet regime in Manchuria would become an inviting Russian objective. Its restitution to China from which Japan took it by force would offer reasonable excuse for a Russian offensive that might receive the blessings of London and Washington. There is a powerful and self-sustained Russian army in Siberia, not engaged or apt to be engaged in the western war.

Fence sitting is neither a glorious nor comfortable occupation for politicians, statesmen or nations but there are times when no other course seems open.

Japan is at that point now, for in addition to Russia, Tokyo must always keep one policy-matching eye trained on the American fleet in the Pacific.

OFFICER BEARSS ASSIGNED TO K. F.

Captain B. J. Staats of the state police, announced Saturday the transfer of Private Jack Bearss from the Medford to the Klamath Falls district, the reassignment effective July 1.

Private Bearss joined the state police in June of 1939, coming from Ashland, and received his preliminary training here. No officer has yet been assigned to replace Private Bearss, headquarters stated.
