

"The Lady From Cheyenne", Western Comedy With Loretta Young, Here

ROBERT PRESTON HEADS BRILLIANT SUPPORTING CAST

Edward Arnold, Gladys George Stars—Is Miss Young's First Westerner.

Loretta Young stars in the first "Western" role of her career in the new frontier comedy, "The Lady From Cheyenne," opening a three-day run today at the Craterian theatre.

A distinguished supporting cast includes Robert Preston, Edward Arnold, Gladys George, Frank Craven, Jessie Ralph, Stanley Fields, Samuel S. Hinds, Willie Best and others.

Based in part on historical incident, Lloyd's comedy takes place on the Wyoming frontier of 1870. Miss Young, as a naive but determined young school-teacher, comes out from Philadelphia to make her fortune and runs afoul of a gang of crooked politicians led by Arnold and Preston.

A conflicting romance grows between Miss Young and Preston, and meanwhile she is goaded by mounting anger to break the power of the gang. How she accomplishes this supplies the plot for one of the season's most novel and entertaining screen vehicles.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was up .1 of a point

at 41.9 and showed a net gain of .2 on the week.

Transfers totalled 180,470 shares compared with 139,550 last Saturday.

DOMESTIC CORK WILL BE GROWN

Davis, Cal. (UP)—California is laying the foundation this year not only for making itself self-sufficient in corks by 1981 but also for the creation of one of the world's largest producing areas of what still ranks as one of the "strategic raw materials."

Cork gets on the "strategic raw material" list as a result of imperative use in life preservers, floats, airplanes, air-conditioning equipment, hat linings, shoe soles, flooring and particularly in bottling.

This year 10,000 cork-oak seedlings will be distributed by the University of California college of agriculture free to all growers who will agree to plant and maintain at least 50 trees. They will produce their first crop of cork bark in about 15 years.

This first crop, college authorities explain will not be particularly valuable. It will be the so-

called "virgin cork" which is rough, unequal and woody in texture. However, it will still have a certain marketable value for use in tanning and as a decorative substance for ferneries.

SOIL CEMENTED FOR ROAD BASE

Austin, Texas.—(UP)—Texas highway 96 again is in the limelight. It first attracted national interest when it was projected and finally built as a direct route to the lower Rio Grande valley and the southernmost point in the United States.

For years traffic had been obliged to make a 50-mile detour around Kenedy county because cattle barons refused to permit a road through ranches. When ranchers consented to have the road its completion was occasion for a big celebration of officials of Texas and Mexico.

Now highway 96 is being watched closely by road engineers because of innovations in its construction. The highway runs through an area where there was no feasible way to get a solid foundation for the roadway by excavation or without hauling gravel, stone or other materials long distances. To provide a stable base for the heavy traffic that is expected over the route, cement was mixed with the natural soil.

WIFE SAVES MATE DRAGGED BY RAKE

Quick thinking on the part of Mrs. William Lindstrom of East Stanwood and the fortitude to carry out her plan of action in the face of danger were credited with saving the life of her husband when he was involved in an accident on the farm of Mrs. Peter Leque of Stanwood recently.

Lindstrom became entangled in the tines of a hay rake when the team he was driving ran away. Twice he was dragged around the field before Mrs. Lindstrom, seeing her husband's plight, stepped in front of the racing horses and threw an armful of hay into their eyes. As the horses veered sharply the rake tilted onto one wheel, releasing Lindstrom, who was unconscious, badly battered and severely lacerated.
